The Pew Perspective

Over the past few weeks, I have noticed that many major newspapers and TV news programs have had "slow news" days. I too, find that "we" in the local religious media are also in a news lull, with little to report in between the Christmas season and the beginning of the new year. So, in keeping with the practice of my more famous news colleagues, I offer you this month a 2002 Barnesville year in review. Here are some of the more important Church news headlines from the past 12 months:

January: Baptist Men's Breakfast, MOB sing, new mural painted in baptistery in memory of Ann Yates, Church Website (barnesvillesbaptist.org) established, new Church computer purchased, Rev. Nardito Manalog gave missionary talk on the Philippines

February: The Eylers in concert

March: new carpeting installed in memory of Earl Shreve, Easter Cantata on Easter Sunday, new sound equipment installed in the sanctuary

April: new Sunday School and Morning Service time, Watkins Cabinet friends built us a cabinet for the sound equipment

May: new Deacon elected, Women's Ministry holds first of several seminars

June: The Barnesville Lantern begins publication, "Bring A Friend" Sunday, *Rushing Wind* concert

July: Vacation Bible School

August: CRC meets, Baptism service held, new Deacon ordained

September: *Singing Evangelists* concert, Church adopts new Constitution and BFM 2000, Sunday School Picnic and Teachers' Meeting

October: new Sunday School year begins with new classes, new teachers, State Missions goal exceed

November: Thanksgiving Service held, many new by-laws passed to carry out the new Church Constitution December: WMU leads focus on Missions, two presentations of the Christmas Cantata, Lottie Moon missions goal exceeded

Baptist Faith and Message, Part IV

IV. Salvation

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.

C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.



BFM Reflection: "Salvation"

John Wesley, a great 18th-century Christian and a founder of the Methodist Church, was asked by a Moravian Christian, "Do you know Jesus Christ?" Wesley answered: "I know He is the Saviour of the world." The questioner then said to him, "True, but do you know He has saved you?" This was an embarrassing question for Wesley. He then determined to find out more about the Moravian Christian beliefs and their experiential quality of Christianity. The Moravians taught a complete self-surrendering faith, an instantaneous conversion, and a joy in believing. On Wednesday, May 24, 1738, the transforming experience came to John Wesley. That evening, as he recorded, he went unwillingly to an Anglican "society" in Aldersgate Street, London, and heard Luther's preface to the Commentary on Romans read. "About a quarter before nine, while he (Luther) was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me, that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death." The farreaching impact of this experience was monumental to the growth of Christianity. Wesley had discovered the simplicity of how one enters the Christian life and he entered into full freedom from fear and complete joy in believing.

The Gospel of salvation by grace through faith is so simple that many people stumble over it. Our part is simple: admit that we have fallen short of God's standards and turn away from what we know is wrong; believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son and accept His gift of forgiveness; and confess our faith in Him. *Romans* 10:9 says "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hat raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved". You see, our part is easy, God does the miraculous part!

Not every experience of salvation is the same. You may have an "Aldersgate" experience like John Wesley with a 'strangely warm feeling'; you may have just a gentle awareness that God has done something in your heart; or you may be electrified with excitement about your new birth in Christ. Whatever your experience, trust God to do His part and He will not disappoint you. Cherish your new faith and allow the Holy Spirit to help you grow in grace and in the knowledge of the Lord. Then, like Wesley, you can enter into full freedom from fear of things in life or death, and complete joy in believing. And all the people said, "Amen".

Yemen and the New Year Randy Gilliam

On Monday, December 30, 2002, a gunman shot and killed 3 medical missionaries in the Baptist Hospital in Jibla, Yemen. A fourth missionary was wounded and has returned to the U.S. The grief and shock caused by this senseless act have touched people around the world. One of the co-workers of those slain said that the residents of Jibla have been "as devastated by the deaths as much as the other Americans at the hospital".

The Baptist Hospital in Jibla treats over 40,000 patients a year and provides free medical treatment and medicine to the poor. The miracle of this ministry isn't the medical treatment provided, but rather the context of unconditional love in which it is given. Listen to comments about the slain missionaries: (Kathleen Gariety) "From the crown of her head to the soles of her feet, she was devoted to this ministry and felt that God had called her to be involved in this hospital"; (William Koehn)

"He gave his life doing what he loved to do, helping people and serving God." (Martha Myers) "She had such a passion for ministry to the people of Yemen. She gave her life to it. It's all she wanted to talk about...She loved the country, she loved the people and she loved being a doctor to help take care of them...She'd give her last dollar so someone else would have food or medical help."

What's ahead for this ministry in Yemen in 2003? "For the past 35 years there's been a lot of plowing of hard, almost punished earth. But, yes, there's a harvest here. God is working in people's hearts." A gentleman who works at the hospital made this comment. God can use this evil attack on love's work to draw a nation and a region to Himself. Jesus set the standard with His own life: *"Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone: but if it dies, it bears much fruit." John 12:24*

For 3 ½ decades this ministry has plowed and cultivated the spiritual soil in Yemen. Many Yemeni people are mourning a great loss and can see in stark contrast the difference between love- and-light and eviland-darkness. "Something is happening in my heart", said one Yemeni national.

Perhaps this is God's time to shake the spiritual soul of this nation and turn it to Himself. Yemen will never be the same. The New Year could truly be a 'great awakening' in this region of the world.
