

The Pew Perspective

One of the more interesting details of the Easter story, I think, occurred immediately after the moment of Jesus' death on the cross, as briefly noted in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke. Matthew described the scene in this way: And Jesus cried out again with a loud voice, and yielded up His spirit. Then, behold, the veil of the temple was torn in **two from top to bottom**; and the earth quaked, and the rocks were split, and the graves were opened; and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised... (Matthew 27:50-52). As described by God to Moses in the Old Testament, the veil of the Temple referred to the thick, multi-layered curtain that isolated the rest of the Tabernacle. and then the Temple, from the inner sanctum known as the Holy of Holies, where God's presence would reside over the Ark of the Covenant to receive the worship and sacrifices administered by the Chief Priest. As anyone who has ever watched an Indiana Jones movie or read through the Old Testament, to in any way disrespect the strict code of conduct concerning the Ark would result in death. Moses and Aaron were especially familiar with treating the Ark with respect, "... after the death of the two sons of Aaron, when they offered profane fire before the LORD, and died; and the LORD said to Moses: "Tell Aaron your brother not to come at just any time into the Holy Place inside the veil, before the mercy seat which is on the ark, lest he die; for I will appear in the cloud above the mercy seat (Leviticus 16:1-2). A sinful man cannot approach a god so holy and perfect as the LORD and withstand his righteousness. To preserve the distance between (and safety of) the people of Israel and the Ark, this thick curtain, or veil, was enshrouded around the Ark to prevent any defilement and immediate divine judgment.

So why then, at the moment of Jesus' death, would a thick curtain like the one in the Temple suddenly break apart? Note the direction of the tear—from top to bottom, as well as the time of the tear, just after Jesus' substitutionary death on the cross was completed. The tearing of the Temple curtain in the specific manner and time it was ripped demonstrates that God Himself supernaturally took down that veil—no human hands were involved. The curtain's destruction proved that Jesus' death was sufficient in God's sight to justify and forgive man's sins against Him, and separation of God from man was no longer necessary.

Through Jesus' death on the cross on that first Good Friday and his bodily resurrection three days later on Sunday morning, we can have that veil of separation between our soul and God removed. There is no need to fear a holy and perfect God when we trust Jesus to forgive us our sins. Instead, we can walk through that torn curtain to be in fellowship with a God who loves us. As Paul wrote to the Jewish people of his day, "... it is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment, so Christ was offered once to bear the sins of many. To those who eagerly wait for Him He will appear a second time, apart from sin, for salvation (Hebrew 9:27-28). As we remember Jesus' sacrifice on the cross and his victory over death and sin during this Easter season, remember that for those who trust in Him, the curtain between God and us is removed forever.

VII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

BFM Reflection: "Baptism & the Lord's Supper"

Being Baptists, it should come as no surprise that the act of baptism, along with the observance of the Lord's Supper, or Communion, are among the most important and visible symbols of our faith. Both of these sacraments are outward manifestations of our personal commitment and relationship to Jesus as our Redeemer and Lord. During this Easter season, the meaning of baptism and the Lord's Supper have great relevance.

In baptism, where a new believer is immersed under water, a word picture is presented to those who witness this act of obedience. Going under water represents the death and burial of the old life characterized by sin and separation from God. Being brought up out of the water shows that we, like Jesus on that first Easter morning, have been raised from death to a new life free from the power and penalty of sin, able to walk in fellowship with God.

The Lord's Supper is observed every first Sunday at Barnesville. The bread and the fruit of the vine we partake remind us of the physical suffering Jesus endured at the Cross on that first Good Friday—the beating and bruising of His body, and the spilling of His blood to cover our sins for all time.

At Barnesville Baptist, baptism is necessary for, and communion is a privilege of, church membership. We are united as a body of believers through our shared faith, our common Savior, and the mutual hope that we will be able to partake in these rites of faith until He returns for his Church.
