The Pew Perspective

For those of you who have read the *Lantern* for a while now, you have noticed that most of our monthly content deals with the life and times of our congregation-light, noncontroversial fare. But from time to time, we cover issues of importance that extend beyond the immediate range of our rural hilltop community. Thus we have previously written on the war in Iraq and abortion. In the last few months, the issue of homosexuality and its acceptance in society has become a prominent item in the news. Since June, the US Supreme Court has ruled in Lawrence v. Texas that sodomy is a protected right under the Fourteenth Amendment's due process clause. Courts in Canada have interpreted that country's constitution to allow same-sex marriages, which the provinces of Ontario and British Columbia now officially recognize. Also, the (US) Episcopal Church is meeting in Minneapolis to consider approving the call of an openly gay cleric to be a bishop, and to consider writing an official blessing for same-sex couples. These developments lead me to write about homosexuality this month.

The Bible is clear and consistent on God's rejection of homosexuality as a legitimate behavior and/or lifestyle. In the Old Testament, verses found in *Genesis 19; Leviticus 18:22, 29,; 20:13* declare God's opposition to not only homosexuality, but all forms of sexual immorality. These spiritual principles of sexual purity are repeated in the New Testament in *Romans 1:26; I Corinthians 6:9; Galatians 5:19-21; Ephesians 5:3-5, I Timothy 1:10; Jude 7.* Although we as Christians under the New Covenant are no longer under Levitical law, the penalty of spiritual death and separation from God are just as present and even more serious than the Old Testament penalties.

Homosexuality, as a sin, is no different from any other sin in God's eyes, be it covetousness, anger, or bearing false witness. We as Christians, with our own past faults and sins, would stand equally condemned before God were it not for Jesus' substitutionary death on the Cross that allows us to stand justified by faith through grace (Romans 1:17; Romans 3:10-18).

Therefore, to reject homosexuality as incompatible with God's design for marital and familial relations is not to hate homosexuals or to condone violence against them. Instead, Scripture teaches that is natural, normal and necessary for children to be raised by a father and mother inside the institution of marriage. To argue otherwise is to reduce fathers and mothers to optional child-rearing preferences, rather than God-ordained roles.

We members of Barnesville Baptist are, unfortunately, part of a culture and society that must now confront the issue of homosexuality. We cannot retreat behind the walls of our Church and say that we should not engage in public affairs, or imagine that this issue does not have spiritual importance. This is an issue where church and state are indelibly intertwined. We must be "salt and light" to a lost and dying world (Matthew 5:13-16).

XI. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. BFM Reflection: "Evangelism & Missions"

The major change in Article XI of the 2000 Baptist Faith and Message is in the final sentence of the article: "it is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ."

The words "verbal witness" were added to the 2000 statement. These two words were absolutely needed, and they added a component to the mandate of missions and evangelism that was conspicuously absent in previous statements.

Lifestyle witness alone is insufficient. The Apostle Paul was clear on this issue when he wrote the church at Rome: "How then will they believe in Him whom they have not heard?" (Romans 10:14a). As Paul admonished Timothy, we are to do the work of an evangelist, clearly speaking the good news of Christ.

"Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age'" (Matthew 28:18-20).

Bill Bright passes away. Bill Bright, the founder of Campus Crusade for Christ, passed away in July. Within evangelical circles he is paired with Billy Graham as the two most influential Christian leaders of the last 50 years. His booklet "The Four Spiritual Laws" is the most widely distributed religious pamphlet in history. It has been printed in at least 200 languages and read by an estimated 2.5 billion people. He was the producer of the "JESUS" film, a featurelength documentary on the life of Christ which has been viewed by more than 5.1 billion people speaking 800 different languages in 234 countries. Rick Warren, Bill's pastor at Saddleback Church in Lake Forest, Calif., asked him "Why do you think God has used and blessed your life so much?" Bill told him the story he has told over and over around the world: "When I was a young man, I made a contract with God. I literally wrote it out and signed my name at the bottom. It said, 'From this day forward, I am a slave of Jesus Christ."

Prayer is, fundamentally, an exercise in trust. Dale A. Matthews, associate professor of medicine at Georgetown University School of Medicine and senior fellow at the National Institute for Healthcare Research, writes in his latest book, *The Faith Factor*, "Our prayers of course, may not be answered in the ways we would prefer. Theologians have written volumes on how to understand this reality, and I will not attempt to understand their findings. For me it is helpful to remember what C.S. Lewis wrote about unanswered prayer in a letter to a friend: 'If God had granted all the silly prayers I have made in my life, where would I be now?'"

"Spiritual maturity involves trusting that God will answer our prayers according to our real needs as He sees them, and not as we with limited vision, see them...After all, the ultimate goal of prayer is not to get our needs met or to get what we want, it is to draw us nearer to God."
