The Pew Perspective

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..."
--The First Amendment to the United States Constitution (1791).

Another matter of religion in public life has emerged, this time in the guise of a federal judge ordering the removal of a Ten Commandments statue from the rotunda of the Alabama state supreme court building. Although the stone monument was removed without incident, Chief Justice Roy Moore and his supporters have not given up their fight. My comments this month will not focus on the chief justice's refusal to remove the stone, or his supporters' civil disobedience. Rather, I would like to discuss the heart of the matter—does the public display of the Ten Commandments violate the First Amendment's ban on establishing religion?

I assume that only the first four commandments are in question, as the last six can easily be converted into totally secular precepts, as all 50 states and the federal government have laws that forbid murder, stealing, perjury, violating contracts, or disturbing the peace. Space does not permit me to recount 200 years of constitutional history on the First Amendment's interpretation. However, I hope that you will trust (and agree with) me when I quote the liberal Justice William Douglas when he wrote for the US Supreme Court that when it comes to interpreting the First Amendment, "...we find no constitutional requirement makes it necessary for government to be hostile to religion and to throw its weight against [it]..." Zorach v. Clauson, 343 US 313 (1967). Instead, the First Amendment ban against establishing a religion forbids the creation of a national church, or having the IRS collect tithes for churches, or preferring one denomination over another. It is impossible for government to be strictly neutral when it comes to religion—any decision that favors religion will necessarily displease atheists and the non-religious, and vice versa. The "wall of separation between church and state" is really intended to be more like a chain-link fence, keeping the government from preaching and the church from governing, but allowing a substantial amount of air and sunlight to pass through.

Having read a copy of the inscriptions on Roy Moore's statue, I can state that it is more than just a religious icon, but rather a monument linking the role of Judeo-Christian religion to the development of Alabama's state law, as well as our nation's founding charters, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, and the historical use of prayer and acknowledging God in our national institutions. None of the inscriptions individually or together creates a national religion, diverts public funds to religious bodies, or shows favoritism to one religious group at others' expense. No one is required to agree with, worship at, or even read the words on the statue. Simply put, I believe a celebration of the religious heritage of our legal system does not establish a national religion. Questions about whether such a monument is appropriate or necessary in the first place can be handled through democratic processes by the state of Alabama, rather than basing it on the opinion of a judge.

XII. Education

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the preeminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in August:


- The Church approved a supplemental budget request in the amount of \$900 to cover the cost of the August Father-Son Banquet and other expenses.
