Toward the end of the Civil War, Union General William Tecumseh Sherman remarked, "war is hell". In a sense, it is. War, like cemeteries, are a constant reminder of humanity's fallen condition and inability to save ourselves from our sinful and violent way of life. Wars have been fought over territory, power, revenge, and other senseless reasons. It has also been waged to pursue liberty, free slaves, repel aggressors, stop genocide, and prevent the spread of further violence. Regardless of the motives, war is still characterized by death, violence, and destruction.

We know that Jesus is the only permanent solution to war, not treaties or alliances. His Gospel has the power to transform men's lives from a pattern of violence to a lifestyle of peace. We await the day that He will return again (and He will), to set up His kingdom as the Prince of Peace Isaiah prophesied about long ago. Looking for a good reason to give to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering? Start with these 11. We have morethanks to the 5,000-plus Southern Baptist missionaries you support through your gifts. Without the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering...

- 1. Missionary Troy Lewis would be unable to minister to people with AIDS like Milita in Lusaka, Zambia. The young girl cares for her grandmother despite being in the last stages of the virus. As the only HIV/AIDS program developer, Lewis hopes to reach more people like Milita with the Gospel before it is too late.
- 2. Mike Loftice and his family would not be able to share the Gospel with Muslims in Gidan Bawa, Niger. He meets twice a week with men from the village to help them learn more about the Gospel.
- 3. Backpackers would not be able to share their faith in village homes while traveling through remote areas of China. The hikers use global positioning system equipment to find their way through the countryside and locate unreached people groups.
- 4. Southern Baptists would not be in war-ravaged countries, such as Afghanistan, to distribute food and supplies to those in need. This year, workers took hundreds of boxes of food and supplies to help the people in this country.
- 5. Families like Mark & Rejeanna Jones may never be able to go to the mission field to share the Gospel. This year, the Joneses and their four children were unable to answer their call to missions because the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering fell 10 million dollars short of its goal.
- 6. Southern Baptist workers in Lebanon would not be able to complete their goal of distributing Bibles to every household in their city. Because of the offering, they are there to minister to Muslims and others who do not have a relationship with Jesus Christ.
- 7. A 12-year-old missionary kid in Peru would not be able to minister to other young girls through a house church she started. She leads her friends in memorizing Bible verses, prepares lessons and leads the group in making crafts.

 8. David and Tami Wood would be unable to help guide
- journeymen in sharing the "Jesus path" with the Marense in Burkina Faso, West Africa. The Woodses have helped lead journeymen in carrying the Gospel to every Marense village in the country.
- 9. Two Southern Baptists living in Paris would not be able to lead a Bible study in their apartment where nine nations from Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Europe are represented. At the Bible study, they read scripture, sing French choruses and pray.
- 10. Mark and Vesta Sauter would be unable to minister to the deaf in Central and Eastern Europe. For more than seven years, the couple has ministered among the deaf there.
- 11. Southern Baptists would be unable to minister to the Zaramo people group in a remote village in Tanzania, where 98 percent are Muslim. Among the Zaramo, 20 new believers recently were baptized after accepting Christ as their Savior.
