The Pastors' Spotlight

Joy (the experience of gladness or true joy in the soul) is a familiar theme throughout the Scriptures. If you ever feel battered by the storms and difficulties of life, pick up a good concordance and go to Scripture passages referring to joy, joyful, rejoicing, and gladness. You cannot help but be moved by expressions of joy and rejoicing because of God's greatness, mercy or faithfulness.

As in the other traits of perfection, like love, humility, forgiveness, patience and kindness, Jesus is also our ultimate model for joy. In John 15:9-11 Jesus reveals that the result of abiding in His love and keeping His commandments is joy. This is true whether life is easy or hard, happy or sorrowful. It is true because we are moving toward the completion of God's will and that brings joy to us and to the Lord. Jesus perfected this truth. In perfect love and obedience to the Father's will, Jesus, "...for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and He sat down at the right hand of the throne of God" (Hebrews 12:2). He accepted and looked beyond the agony of the cross to the joy of bringing salvation to those He loved. This Easter season, be renewed in your spirit by the Lord's example. Abide in His love, obey His commandments in your life with His help and you will experience His joy (true joy in the soul).

The Pew Perspective

Palm Sunday is such an interesting event because it is chockfull of symbolism and meaning. It was also a potentially dangerous day for Jesus, even beyond the Pharisees' smoldering anger. The deeds performed and words spoken on that day could have just as easily angered and worried the Romans. Palm Sunday took place in the context of Passover, just as the Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Sunday did. Passover, as we all know, commemorates the emancipation of the Hebrew slaves from Egypt after a series of devastating plagues that culminated with the death of the firstborn of Egypt. The Jewish nation was to gather at Jerusalem every year to remember this event with worship and ceremony. In Jesus' day, this annual event, nearly 15 centuries old, was held during a time of Roman occupation.

In a sense, Passover is the Jewish equivalent of America's Fourth of July. Imagine the United States living under foreign occupation, and then having millions of Americans coming from across the nation to the National Mall on July 4th to celebrate their ancient day of freedom. If that sounds like a recipe for trouble, then you understand what the Roman soldiers in Jerusalem were thinking. They didn't want any problems from zealous Jewish patriots. However, Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem was not quiet. First, "...two blind men sitting by the road, when they heard that Jesus was passing by, cried out, saying, "Have mercy on us, O Lord, Son of David!" Then the multitude warned them that they should be quiet; but they cried out all the more, saying, "Have mercy on us, O Lord, Son of David" (Matthew 20:30-31)! "Son of David" wasn't just a title of respect, but a claim that Jesus is the rightful Ruler of Israel. Don't forget that Jesus was riding atop a young donkey, fulfilling the Messianic prophecy that said, "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your King is coming to you; He is just and having salvation, Lowly and riding on a donkey, A colt, the foal of a donkey" (Zechariah 9:9). And shout the crowd did, with a mix of religious and patriotic fervor. "And a very great multitude spread their clothes on the road; others cut down branches from the trees and spread them on the road. Then the multitudes who went before and those who followed cried out, saying: "Hosanna to the Son of David! "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the LORD!' Hosanna in the highest!" And when He had come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved..." (Matthew 21:8-11). Spreading branches and clothes was a traditional greeting for a king, and doing so on Jerusalem's front door was a gauntlet thrown down at the Romans' feet. Therefore, "... some of the Pharisees called to Him from the crowd, "Teacher, rebuke Your disciples." But He answered and said to them, "I tell you that if these should keep silent, the stones would immediately cry out" (Luke 19:39-40).

The Pharisees wanted to keep the Romans happy and stifle any thought that Jesus was the Messiah. But how could anyone keep their praise quiet, either then or now, when we know that Jesus is indeed King, Messiah, and Savior? As we approach the Easter season, let us remember the great love the Father has shown to us through Jesus His Son, that we could become his sons and daughters.
