The Pastors' Spotlight In This Edition:

"Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity" (I Timothy 4:12).

This was the admonition from the Apostle Paul to the young pastor Timothy. Young people today need the encouragement and nurturing of mature Christians to help them mature in the faith and prepare for some area of service in the local church or in the world church. The Pew Perspective

A couple of weekends ago, I found myself pruning a honeysuckle vine growing outside our shed. The plant was a tangled mess with last summer's growth brown and lifeless after a winter's worth of cold and darkness. I knew that as long as I didn't cut the main stem, I could hack away at the branches and twigs without fear, for whatever skills I lack as a barber will soon be forgotten as the honeysuckle sends forth a springtime rush of new greenery. This activity reminded me of John 15:1-2, which reads, "I am the true vine, and My Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in Me that does not bear fruit He takes away; and every branch that bears fruit He prunes, that it may bear more fruit". Just as honeysuckle branches depend on the stem for growth and nourishment, Jesus is our spiritual source of life, and His Father guides and directs our spiritual walk. Without trimming and pruning to guide a plant's growth, even the most elaborate topiary soon becomes just another shrub. Similarly, we need guidance and direction in our own lives. Many times, this involves diminishing and removing, or pruning, behaviors, goals, and attitudes that distance or distract us from God's will for our lives. People, like plants, find it difficult to self-prune, so how fortunate are we to have a top-notch Vinedresser available to us? John explained why God corrects His followers: "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent" (Revelation 3:19).

Paul reminded the Christians of Rome how it came to pass that they, as Gentiles, were included in the Master's garden: "And if some of the branches were broken off, and you, being a wild olive tree, were grafted in among them, and with them became a partaker of the root and fatness of the olive tree, do not boast against the branches. But if you do boast, remember that you do not support the root, but the root supports you" (Romans 11:17-18). Gentiles, not being descendants of Abraham, were not initially included in God's promise of salvation. However, the Great Commission mandate that the Gospel go unto the ends of the earth allowed us to become adopted, or grafted, into the family of God through the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ we just celebrated at Easter. Our salvation gives us more than just life, but causes us to bear fruit. Again, Jesus uses the metaphor of the vine and branches to explain what happens when a person is made alive in Christ: *"I am the vine, vou* are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing. If anyone does not abide in Me, he is cast out as a branch and is withered: and they gather them and throw them into the fire, and they are burned" (John 15:5-6). Just as I would be disappointed if my honeysuckle failed to send forth leaves and flowers, Jesus expects to grow in knowledge and grace, not stay in a permanent winter-time slumber. Remember, "...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control... (Galatians 5:22-23). Christians who fail to display this cornucopia of Christ-likeness are no more useful than a dead branch. As spring approaches, let us continue to abide in Christ, that He may give us the abundant life He has promised to those who love Him.
