The Pew Perspective

My Sunday School class has been reading the book of *Matthew* for the last few months. One of the more interesting characters (besides Jesus) is the apostle Peter. He is one of Jesus' inner circle (count the number of times Peter, James, and John are mentioned). Peter is capable of both profound acts of faith, as well as jaw-dropping stumbles and foibles. In Matthew 14:22-33, the disciples were sailing on the Sea of Galilee when a fierce squall arose. When the disciples saw Jesus walking on the water, they were sure they were looking at a ghost. But Peter recognized Jesus, and asked, "Lord, if it is You, command me to come to You on the water" (Matthew 14:28. Moments later however, focusing on the storm and surf around him, Peter's faith evaporated and he began to sink, crying out, "...Lord, save me" (Matthew 14:30)! Peter's next profound moment of faith was when he identified Jesus as, "...the Christ, the Son of the Living God" (Matthew 16:16). Jesus praised Peter for this heaven-sent insight, calling him blessed. However, seven verses later, in Matthew 16:23, Jesus called Peter "Satan" for opposing Jesus' intention to travel to Jerusalem to be crucified. Matthew 26 described Peter's biggest failure of faith. During the Last Supper, Jesus predicted, with Old Testament

During the Last Supper, Jesus predicted, with Old Testament prophecy as support, that His followers would abandon Him during his crucifixion. Luke records Jesus as saying, "...Simon, Simon! Indeed, Satan has asked for you, that he may sift you as wheat. But I have prayed for you, that your faith should not fail; and when you have returned to Me, strengthen your brethren" (Luke 22:31). Yet Peter claimed to be the most devoted of all Jesus' followers, saying, "...Even if I have to die with You, I will not deny You" (Matthew 26:35)! Although Matthew does not record Peter's betrayal, Mark quotes Peter as swearing and cursing that, "...I do not know this Man of whom you speak" when he was confronted by those around the courtyard fire (Mark 14:71)!

In each of these cases, Jesus blessed Peter when he followed God's will. However, when Peter deviated from God's will, he got into trouble. Peter was not the only apostle to betray Jesus. Judas Iscariot received 40 pieces of silver to identify Jesus with a kiss to the Roman guards in the Garden of Gesthsemane. So what was the difference between the two? Judas ran from Jesus and tried to solve his problem alone. Peter, instead, ran *to* Jesus and let his Lord solve his problem and forgive him. In John 21, Peter was fishing on the Sea of Galilee when Jesus appeared to His disciples. Upon recognizing their risen Lord, the apostles quickly rowed ashore. Yet John records that Peter "plunged into the sea" to get to Jesus first (John 21:7). After breakfast, Jesus forgave Peter for his three-fold denial and restored him with a series of three "do you love Me?" questions in John 21:15-17, challenging him to "feed My lambs"; "tend My sheep"; and "feed My sheep".

We should not be too critical of Peter for his lapses, for we are very much like him. We likewise often walk in our own direction and with our own strength. Yet our successes only come when we follow Jesus and lean on Him. We can also receive forgiveness and restoration for our sins and shortcomings when we run to Jesus, and not run from Him.
