The Pastors' Spotlight

"Faith is a divine work in us which changes us and makes us to be born anew of God...O, it is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, this faith"! So said Martin Luther in his preface to the Epistle to the Romans. No doubt most who read this newsletter agree that believing the gospel of Jesus Christ and putting our faith in Him has life-changing power. Therefore, a believer's life should be noticeably different from those who do not profess a relationship with Christ. This difference is a positive, optimistic, style of life expressed in joy, gratitude, love, patience, gentleness, forgiveness, and kindness. As believers mature in the faith they become conformed to the image of Christ more and more and less and less like the world that resists godly standards. The changed life is how Christians represent God in their families and in the marketplaces of the world.

An old hymn of the church, "Take My Life and Let It Be", written by Frances Havergal (1836-1879), is a prayer of commitment of one's whole body and life to honor the Lord. William Reynolds in his book, *Hymns of Our Faith* (Broadman, 1964), relates this about Frances: "At the age of fourteen she underwent a deep religious experience and later wrote, 'There and then I committed my soul to the Saviour--and earth and heaven seemed bright from that moment'. All of her hymns reflect the joy of this experience of commitment and consecration".

The world, with all of its violence and evil, desperately needs Christians whose lives are committed to the risen Savior and who can, by example, bring light and help to people who need to know that God loves them.

Take my life and let it be, consecrated, Lord to Thee; Take my moments and my days; Let them flow in ceaseless praise. Let them flow in ceaseless praise.

The Pew Perspective

Can you lose your salvation? An advertisement on the last page of the Aug. 18, 2006 *Fishwrapper* (a Christian newspaper from rural Pennsylvania with inspirational articles and cornball humor to which several BBC members subscribe) argues yes, citing Scriptures such as *I Corinthians* 15:2, Titus 2:12, and Galatians 6:8-9.

Since more than a few Christians believe salvation can be lost, I'd like to address this issue this month. It is indeed true, as the above-mentioned verses indicate, that real Christians must have died to their sins and abandoned their former, sinful way of life. However, salvation cannot be lost. It is true that there are people—tares among the wheat—who claim the name of Jesus, show up to church each Sunday, and participate in the requisite activities, but have never put their faith in Christ. Such people eventually fade away during trials and testing. Salvation cannot be lost like a newspaper subscription you forgot to renew or an annual membership fee that wasn't paid. The key issue when it comes to the doctrine of assurance, or eternal security, is Who is holding on to whom.

The Bible teaches that God chose to save you from your sinful state, forgive you with the blood of His Son, adopt you into His holy Kingdom, set you apart to His service, and will one day receive you into His presence. Until then, He sustains your faith, shapes you into a more Christ-like person, and secures your salvation for His glory. Jesus gave a powerful promise of eternal salvation when He told His disciples, "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand" (John 10:27-28). Once we are born again, Jesus guards our souls and our hearts with all of His might. We may wriggle and squirm at times due to our weaknesses and temptations, but He continues to hold onto us. We need not worry about losing hold of Him.

The apostle Peter, who stumbled several times in his faith, was confident in the permanence of salvation. He described it as, "...an inheritance incorruptible and undefiled and that does not fade away, reserved in heaven for you, who are kept by the power of God through faith for salvation ready to be revealed in the last time" (I Peter 1:4-5). Again, the emphasis is on God's guarantee that we are saved, without any human involvement necessary to safeguard our place in heaven.

Paul similarly wrote about the assurance we have, saying he was, "...confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6). God finishes what He starts. Paul also penned these words, which should give all Christians comfort when it comes to their salvation: "In Him you also trusted, after you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation; in whom also, having believed, you were sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, who is the guarantee of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession, to the praise of His glory" (Ephesians 1:13-14). I am so glad to know Jesus Christ is responsible for securing my salvation, and not me. What a "blessed assurance"!

- Jim & Gale Cole submitted their resignations as Church Musicians, effective Sept. 17.
- The 135th Annual Business Meeting was rescheduled for Sept. 27 due to the date of the fall revival.

Report from the 135th Annual Business Meeting:

- The Internal Administration Committee received permission to install insulation and gutter guards.
- A resolution to begin the annual budget process for 2007 was adopted by the Church; the standing committees will report to the Treasurer by Nov. 5.
- The Pastors and Deacons nominated Bill Morrison and Ralph Wright to serve as Deacons. The nominations will be voted on by the Church at the November Business Meeting.
- The Select Committee on Nominations reported six motions to fill church officer and committee positions for 2006-2008, all of which were approved by the Church. These officers and committee members will begin their positions on Oct. 5.
