The Pastors' Spotlight

"I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you" (Psalm 119:11). "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart" (Hebrews 4:12). "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105).

If these Scripture verses truly represent our desire to know the Bible and the power of God's Word, then it is reasonable to make a consistent effort to read and study His Word. We used to hear it said that the Bible is the most-sold and leastread book in the world. Perhaps that's true. However, in the Christian community, not reading the Scriptures and not learning about the character of God causes Christians to lose their bearings and their spiritual and moral anchor in a sea of changing attitudes and practices. This is no small issue considering the enormous cultural shifts away from traditional values.

Why not commit yourself this February to get better acquainted with the Bible? Some ways to do this might be to pray and then read a short passage of Scripture every day; select a book of the Bible to study and have a commentary on that book to refer to; join or form a small Bible study group; attend a regular Bible study class at church (the Adult Sunday School class will be studying lessons from *John* in March and April); memorize passages of Scripture; take notes on Sunday sermons and then study the text to see if what you heard was consistent with what you read for yourself. Then share that with your pastors. Imagine how much learning would take place and how your pastors would be challenged if everyone took notes on Sunday morning sermons!

The Pew Perspective

What exactly is the Trinity? This doctrine seems to me to be one of the harder beliefs for Christians to wrap their minds around. Among monotheists, Muslims have accused Christians of being polytheists for proclaiming it, and most Jews deny that Jesus is the Son of their God. However, believing in the Trinity is a fundamental cornerstone of the faith. There is no one "go to" verse in the Bible that explains the Trinity in a neat phrase, but it is based on 4 key facts that the Bible teaches over and over: A) There is only one God (*Deuteronomy 6:4, Isaiah 45:5-7, I Corinthians 8:4*); B) The Father is God (*Genesis 1:1, Proverbs 30:4*); C) Jesus Christ, the Son, is God (*Matthew 1:23, 28:18-19, Colossians 2:9*); and D) the Holy Spirit is God (*Psalm 139:7, Acts 5:3-4, II Corinthians 3:17-18*).

Perhaps the Trinity is hard to understand because we have little to compare it with, just as it is hard to understand that God is infinite and eternal when we have only experienced life in a universe that is limited by time and space, where everything has a beginning and end. We are not able to comprehend (fully understand) the nature of God, but rather can only apprehend (be imperfectly aware of) Who He is.

The best explanation I have seen for the Trinity is that when it comes to God, there is one What and three Whos: there is one Being that is God, and within that one Being, there are three Persons who are equally, fully, inseparably, and eternally God. Those three Persons have their own personality, will, and intelligence, but co-exist and cooperate in a perfect, seamless unity. God does not wear three different hats of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as if an actor in a one-man play. Instead, a better analogy is that of time, where past, present, and future exist together in perfect harmony. A dramatic, visible expression of the Trinity is found in *Mark 1:10-11*, at the baptism of Jesus. When Jesus came up out of the Jordan, "He saw the heavens parting and the Spirit descending upon Him like a dove. Then a voice from heaven, "You are My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased". It is in the name of this Trinity that we are baptized (Matthew 28:19).

Why does the Trinity matter so much? Not only does a proper respect for the Bible require it, the Trinity is essential to our salvation, worship, and prayer. We received salvation because of the great love of the Father that sent the Son to redeem us. Through the ministry of the Son, we became aware of the Father and His will for our lives, and can stand justified before the One against Whom we have sinned. It is the Holy Spirit that gave us ears to hear and eyes to see spiritual things and seek after God, cleansed us from all sin, then indwelt and empowered us to lead acceptable lives of faith, obedience, and service. We worship Jesus Christ in spirit and truth to the glory of God the Father using the gifts of the Spirit. Our prayers to the Father are mediated by Jesus Christ our High Priest, and are given voice through the Holy Spirit. Without the Trinity, our salvation, worship, and prayer are undone. Is the Trinity still hard to understand? It is for me too. But each night I can see the stars set ablaze by the Father, feel the love of Christ in my soul, and know that any talent or service I perform is inspired not from my own strength, but that of the Holy Spirit.
