The Pew Perspective

I have noticed that throughout the Bible, when God wants to use someone to accomplish something great for His glory, God does most, if not all, of the heavy lifting, and only asks for our faith and obedience. I had noticed this trend before, but it was really evident when I read the story of Peter and Cornelius in Acts 10. God was at work in Cornelius' life. Although a Roman centurion, Cornelius feared and respected the God of the Jews. A moral and decent man, Cornelius still needed a Savior. Up to that time, however, Jesus had only been preached to, and accepted by, Jews. However, God's love extended to all mankind, as evidenced by verses such as Isaiah 49:6, which reads, "Indeed He says, 'It is too small a thing that You should be My Servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob, and to restore the preserved ones of Israel: I will also give You as a light to the Gentiles, that You should be My salvation to the ends of the earth". God thus sent an angel to Cornelius, instructing him to send for Peter, in nearby Joppa, to speak to Cornelius in Caesarea.

Peter, a devout observer of all the Old Testament regulations, would never associate with a Gentile or enter his house. God prepared Peter for Cornelius' call with a vision, showing him a sheet full of levitically unclean animals and thrice instructing him to, "Rise, Peter; kill and eat" (Acts 10:13). It was in this vision that God rescinded the dietary restrictions of the Old Testament. No longer did holiness to the Lord require outward conformity to rules and ceremony, but inner sanctification by the Holy Spirit. As soon as the vision ended, Cornelius' messengers arrived, requesting that Peter speak to his entire household. Peter went with them without any objections, explaining to Cornelius when he arrived the meaning of his vision, that, "... God has shown me that I should not call any man common or unclean" (Acts 10:28). Peter then proceeded to share with Cornelius and his entire household the good news about Jesus-who He was and what He did to offer salvation to all men. Those who believed were immediately indwelled by the Holy Spirit, and entered the Kingdom as the first Gentile Christians. It was this incident that opened the doors for the Gospel to be preached to all mankind, foreshadowing the verse, "There is neither Jew nor Greek...for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). I find it very interesting how God orchestrated all the events of this situation, prompting Cornelius to send for Peter while working on Peter's heart to accept the offer to speak with a Gentile. Similar stories like that of the Exodus come to mind. where God inflicted the plagues that forced Pharaoh to free the Hebrew slaves; also the Conquest, where God knocked down the walls of Jericho. What did these stories' human actors do? Moses agreed to speak the words God gave him and wave his staff around; Joshua followed God's instructions to march around Jericho several times and shout. Peter could have refused to go to Caesarea, Moses might have remained a shepherd in the Sinai, and Joshua could have decided to attack Jericho with his army. However, all three put their faith in God and obeyed His will for their lives. Their great victories and achievements resulted from the works God performed. God likewise wants to display His glory in our lives. What great things would occur if we put our faith and obedience in His hands?


