The Pastors' Spotlight

"Sing to the Lord with the harp, with the harp and the sound of a psalm...shout joyfully before the Lord..." (Psalm 98:5-6).

God gifts people to sing joyfully to Him with the harp and sound of psalms, like Andrew Bennett, who ministered to us in the April 29 worship service. Andrew accompanied the congregation and choir on his flute and harp, and also sang hymns, psalms, and commentary on scriptures. He declared in music and song the awesomeness of God's love and the gospel of Jesus Christ. Andrew's heart in ministry is to bring



God's love to people. When people allow God to reveal His boundless love to them, their response is faith, repentance, and adoration. The powerful message delivered by harp is, as Andrew describes it, "a steel fist in a velvet glove". Andrew built his first harp out of scrap wood and electrical conduit pipe, plus fishing line and weedwacker cords for the

strings. Hex bolts adjust the string tension, so he tuned the harp with a ratchet wrench. His newer, more elaborate harp also has a beautiful sound. Weighing about thirty pounds, it is more portable and versatile than a full-sized concert harp.

Andrew's heart is burdened for the people of Washington, D.C. God has opened amazing opportunities for Andrew to minister in Christian and secular venues where He is at work in powerful ways, from intimate prayer meetings to public displays of praise. Andrew described how after leaving a National Day of Prayer performance at the Dirkson Senate Office Building, a very strong wind blew across the harp strings, producing a "loud, different, unworldly, beautiful sound" as scores of people came down the building steps. It was as though God reached out to people saying, "I love you". To minister in places where a harp is too large, Andrew also built a unique 20-string lyre. Andrew truly is a modern day psalmist, called and gifted by God to bring His love and the truth of His Word to all who will listen.

The Pew Perspective

Last month I discussed how God does most of the heavy lifting to accomplish great things for His glory. That doesn't mean, however, we are to be passive observers. The Lord will prepare and test us for His use. He calls us to salvation as we are, then grows us and improves us for the benefit of His Kingdom. God continually works on His children's faith, attitudes, and will. Three good examples of this truth from the Bible come to mind: Joseph and Gideon from the Old Testament, and Saul/Paul from the New.

We first knew Joseph as the youngest of Jacob's sons-a momma's boy, a dreamer. His older brothers, jealous of the favoritism showed to Joseph by their father, sold him into Egyptian slavery. In Egypt, Joseph prospered in spite of difficulties, rising to become second only to the Pharaoh. saving the whole land from famine. Through the trials and unjust treatment in his life, Joseph was readied by God to preserve his entire family from death. In his darkest hours, Joseph had no one to rely on but the Lord. His early testing allowed a grown-up Joseph to meet his brothers not with resentment, but with love, saying to them, "...God sent me before you to preserve a posterity for you in the earth, and to save your lives by a great deliverance. So now it was not you who sent me here, but God; and He has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house, and a ruler throughout all the land of Egypt" (Genesis 45:7-8).

In the case of Gideon, in *Judges 6:11-12* we find a frightened, cowardly man, hiding from his enemies: *"Gideon threshed wheat in the winepress, in order to hide it from the Midianites. And the Angel of the LORD appeared to him, and said to him, "The LORD is with you, you mighty man of valor!"* Gideon was fruitlessly working at the bottom of the hill lest he be spotted by the Midianites who dominated Israel in that day. However, God called Gideon not a coward, but a mighty man of valor, because that is the type of servant God would make him. Building up his faith and trust, God prepared Gideon to lead Israel into victory over their enemies with a vastly outnumbered army. God provided the victory, but He chose and worked through Gideon to achieve it.

The first time we encountered Saul (Paul), he was an accomplice to murder, holding the coats of those who stoned Stephen. But God took this murderous, vengeful Pharisee and used the crucible of hardship and trial to turn him into one of the Church's all-time most effective witnesses for Christ. The Lord started out by saying, "...he is a chosen vessel of Mine to bear My name before Gentiles, kings, and the children of Israel. For I will show him how many things he must suffer for My name's sake" (Acts 9:15-16). Indeed, Paul suffered to share the good news of the gospel across the Roman Empire. Reflecting on his ministry toward the end of his life, Paul wrote, "...I was beaten with rods; once I was stoned; three times I was shipwrecked...in sleeplessness often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness" (II Corinthians 11:25, 27). But Paul's legacy endures to this day. Whether God raises you up to high offices to speak to the multitudes, or leads you through dark valleys to reach the least among us, He will actively use you and change you to serve as an instrument of His grace.
