The Pastors' Spotlight

"I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercessions and thanksgiving be made for everyone – for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Savior, who wants all men to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth" (I Timothy 2:1-2).

In this passage, the Apostle Paul expressed to Timothy that the first priority for believers is prayer. This admonition speaks to us even today as the Church ministers with love and compassion in the name of Jesus to all who need help or encouragement, taking the gospel of Christ to all people. The Church's mission is facilitated when fervent prayer is made on behalf of civil authorities. In Paul's day that was the Roman Emperor (Nero). Today, in the United States, those in authority include the president, his cabinet, Congress, governors, military leaders, elected state officials, and judges. As Christians and citizens we sometimes feel isolated from those in authority and feel helpless in terms of influencing their decisions or actions. We should take heart, dust off our faith, and be emboldened to realize that our prayers for those leaders bring the very power and will of God to bear on them. How should we pray for them? Here is part of a very famous prayer by Clement of Rome for the emperor (c. 90 A.D.), "...grant unto them, therefore, O Lord, health, peace, concord, stability, that they may minister the government... without failure...Direct their counsel according to that which is well-pleasing in thy sight...administering power in peace and gentleness with godliness, that they may obtain thy favor." (1 Clement 61)

Please make prayer for our leaders a daily priority. This is the best way for us to help effect a quiet and peaceful environment for God's work, even in places experiencing war. God loves all people and wants them to know the truth. During this July 4th celebration of our nation's birth, be sure to offer prayers of thanksgiving for God's providence and blessing in the creation and protection of this great nation.



The Pew Perspective

What picture do you have of Samson? I always imagined him as looking like some sort of Viking warrior, his muscles having muscles of their own, but that's not how the Bible describes Samson in the book of *Judges*. Instead, we learn that Samson was a Nazirite—one who had taken a vow to serve God his whole life. The three rules of a Nazirite were abstaining from alcohol, never cutting his hair, nor touching the dead. Thus Samson didn't look like a heavyweight boxer, but was a regularlooking albeit shaggy-haired guy. So from where did his unusual powers come? Whenever Samson was about to perform some great feat against Israel's Philistine enemies, we read that, "...the Spirit of the LORD came upon him mightily..." (Judges 14:19). It was for this reason that the Philistines pressured Delilah to figure out the secret of Samson's strength—it certainly wasn't because of his physique. Samson's physical strength came from his relationship with the Lord. When he was separated from God by sin and disobedience, he was powerless against his enemies.

This dynamic is present in many situations in the Bible. In *II Chronicles* we see the effects of trusting God's strength versus relying on one's own strength in the cases of Kings Solomon and Rehoboam. The first relied on God, the second on his own abilities: "Now Solomon the son of David was strengthened in his kingdom, and the LORD his God was with him and exalted him exceedingly" (1:1), and, "Now it came to pass, when Rehoboam had established the kingdom and had strengthened himself, that he forsook the law of the LORD, and all Israel along with him" (12:1). Solomon, who relied on God, became a fabulously wealthy and successful king; Rehoboam, who rejected God in his life, presided over the breakup of the kingdom.

We too derive our strength from our relationship with God. Over and over again we find verses in the Bible that encourage us to lean on God for power, such as: "The LORD is my strength and song, and He has become my salvation" (Psalm 118:14); "The LORD God is my strength..." (Habakkuk 3:19); "But truly I am full of power by the Spirit of the LORD..." (Micah 3:8). We may never destroy God's enemies by the thousands or knock down temple pillars like Samson, but our power to do what is right, follow after God, practice spiritual disciplines like prayer and Bible study, and share the Gospel with friends and strangers does not come from within ourselves, it originates with the God we serve. Paul's prayer for the Church was that, "...He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with might through His Spirit in the inner man...to know the love of Christ which passes knowledge; that you may be filled with all the fullness of God" (Ephesians 3:16,19). The Lord wants to use us for great things; He will empower those who love and serve Him to accomplish His will in our lives. Will you trust God to strengthen you with His Spirit?
