The Pastors' Spotlight

"This is what the Lord says, 'Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls'"

Jeremiah 6:16-17 (NIV).

Jeremiah prophesied a coming judgment on Judah because of the people's rebellion against God and their rejection of His law. Jeremiah's encouragement to them from the Lord was, think about what you are doing and ask where the "good way" is. The "good way" begins with reverence for God and loving Him. This leads to repentance, reconciliation with God, and right decisions. The result of this is "rest for your souls".

We all know from experience what happens when someone stands at a crossroad in life and chooses a direction contrary to the teaching of Scripture, e.g. the Ten Commandments, loving God and other people. The results can be devastating.

A good illustration of this truth comes from the hiking trails on Sugarloaf Mountain here in upper Montgomery County. A hiker gets a map of the trails and chooses which one he or she will take. The trails are mapped out and marked by a color: yellow, white, blue, orange, red, or green. As the hiker goes along he or she can follow the trail because the markers are painted on trees at various intervals. This keeps the hiker from getting lost. But more than this, there is a note on the trail map that says that Sugarloaf Mountain is the natural habitat of timber rattlers and copperhead snakes. Now, staying on the trail becomes really important because the hiker can normally avoid an encounter with one of these poisonous creatures. Getting off the trail exposes the hiker to an avoidable danger. In life there are dangerous situations, the rattlers and copperheads of life, which we can avoid by wisely choosing the "good way", that is, God's way.



The Pew Perspective

The Baptist Men held our fifth annual Father-Child Banquet this past month. As the emcee for the evening, my opening comments were based on a psalm of David, where he spoke of his trust and faith in God throughout his lifetime, from his birth and youth to the end of his life. David also spoke of his faith as a legacy to be passed down to his family and even generations to come. Two key verses that express these thoughts are found toward the end of the scripture, where David wrote, "O God, You have taught me from my youth; and to this day I declare Your wondrous works. Now also when I am old and grayheaded, O God, do not forsake me, until I declare Your strength to this generation, Your power to everyone who is to come" (Psalm 71:17-18).

David, after expressing his faith and appreciation for God's great goodness in his life at the beginning of the psalm, used the end of the psalm to respond in gratitude by making five "I will" statements: I will trust you, I will praise you, I will speak of Your righteousness, I will walk in You, and, I will declare You. These statements should be just as true for us today as they were for David when he first wrote them.

The first statement, I will trust You, meant that David would rely on God when he was afraid and didn't know what to do. As Paul explained this idea, "...We should not trust in ourselves but in God who raises the dead, who delivered us from so great a death, and does deliver us; in whom we trust that He will still deliver us..." (II Corinthians 1:9-10).

The second statement, I will praise You, means that both David and we today should thank God for His goodness, grace, and mercy in our lives. Those who follow Christ have been doing this from the beginning, as Luke recorded: "Then, as He [Jesus] was now drawing near the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works they had seen..." (Luke 19:37).

The third statement, I will speak of Your righteousness and salvation, is based on God's redeeming love for all mankind. Paul wrote, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek" (Romans 1:16).

Fourthly, David wrote I will walk in You, expressing that he wanted to follow the Lord's will and plan for his life. As John wrote, Jesus has a plan for each of our lives: "Then Jesus spoke to them again, saying, 'I am the light of the world. He who follows Me shall not walk in darkness, but have the light of life" (John 8:12).

Finally, David concluded his psalm with a 'I will declare You' statement, meaning that those who love God should share His gospel with their family, friends, and neighbors. As Peter explained, this is the Christian's high calling: "But you are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light" (I Peter 2:9-10).

David's 'I will' statements are good disciplines to practice as we strive to become better followers of Jesus Christ, and even better habits to share with our families. Will you also apply these 'I wills' in your life?

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in August:


