The Pew Perspective

I realized something rather counterintuitive as I prepared this Christmas-themed column, something that made me stop and wonder--we were adopted by a Baby. It is not uncommon to hear about adults who adopt small infants, but Paul tells us that, "...when the fullness of the time had come. God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, that we might receive the adoption as sons" (Galatians 4:4-5). I have noticed over the years that God likes paradoxes. For example: "He who loves his life will lose it, and he who hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life" (John 12:25); "But many who are first will be *last, and the last first" (Mark 10:31).* Why God's truths are so simple and yet at the same time so profound I do not know, but, as Jesus said, "...I thank You, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that You have hidden these things from the wise and prudent and have revealed them to babes..." (Matthew 11:25).

Jesus came in "the fullness of time"—in other words, with perfect timing; neither too early nor too late. Jesus was born at a time and place in history when and where the Gospel would have maximum exposure. Bethlehem was located at the intersection of three continents, and, at the dawn of the first century, A.D., was situated in the middle of a massive empire (stretching from Britain to Babylon) connected by Roman roads, governed by Roman laws, and unified by Greek culture and language. Christ was born into a world lost and confused by spiritual things. The Greeks and Romans were busy trying to appease a host of marble gods and goddesses, and all but a remnant of God's chosen people were trapped by a strangling set of rules and regulations for religious observance. Yet Christ came to call us to Himself.

When Jesus called the world to a saving knowledge of Himself during His earthly ministry, and called us today by name through the Holy Spirit, He offered us the opportunity to become children of His Father, instead of, "aliens from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For He Himself is our peace... Now, therefore, you are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:12-14, *19).* The Prince of Peace brought peace on earth and God's favor to mankind by His very presence, bringing us in from the cold and grafting us into His family through faith (see Romans 11:17-24). As Paul explained, "For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. And if you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise" (Galatians 3:26,29).

During Christmastime it is especially easy to say along with the hymn writer, "I stand amazed in the presence of Jesus the Nazarene...", a Baby who adopts, a Lord who came to serve, a Savior who died to give us life. Take time to stop and wonder at the paradoxes of God in this special season.

- The Worship Committee offered a bypass motion to purchase a projector system, which the Church accepted.

- An Education Committee motion to increase the 2007 VBS budget line item by \$500.00 will be proposed.
- A motion from the Groundsmen to install three lowflow commodes in the church and parsonage will be made.
