The Pew Perspective

One of the most heart-stopping stories in the Bible must be found in Genesis 22, which my Sunday School class recently read. This 19-verse-long account, which details God's command for Abraham to sacrifice his son Isaac, is a breathtaking read from start to finish. In these verses, both Abraham and Isaac display extreme faith, putting total trust in their God. I can't imagine the fear, doubt, and confusion God's strange request brought to Abraham and Isaac. Think of Abraham, well over 100 years old at the time, being asked to give up the son of promise for whom he and his wife spent decades waiting and praying to God. Oh how Abraham rejoiced to finally hear God's words that, "...Sarah your wife shall bear you a son, and you shall call his name Isaac; I will establish My covenant with him for an everlasting covenant. and with his descendants after him" (Genesis 17:19). How could God keep his promise to give Abraham descendants like the sand of the seashore or the stars of the sky if He required Isaac's life? Surely Abraham took each step toward Moriah with a heavy heart and a troubled soul.

Isaac himself was no little boy—he was old enough to take the wood for the burnt offering up the mountain on his back (verse 6). No doubt, Isaac was strong and fast enough to escape his elderly father if he so wanted. I assume that not too long after Isaac wondered where the sacrifice was in verse 7 that he put two and two together. However, Isaac obeyed his father and his God, and we do not read of any resistance on his part when he was placed on the altar in verse 9.

Yet Abraham, in spite of all he didn't understand about what God had asked him to do, knew that God was One who kept His promises, made the impossible possible, and made a way where there was none. Abraham had nothing left but his faith, which he relied on to say in verse 5, "...the lad and I will go yonder and worship, and we will come back to you"--both of them, both Abraham and Isaac. Abraham believed that even if Isaac's life were required that day, God would still fulfill his covenant promises. As we read in the New Testament, "By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises offered up his only begotten son, of whom it was said, "In Isaac your seed shall be called," concluding that God was able to raise him up, even from the dead, from which he also received him in a figurative sense" (Hebrews 11:17-19).

We all know the end of the story, how God stopped Abraham in mid-plunge, telling Abraham, "because you have done this thing, and have not withheld your son, your only son—blessing I will bless you...because you have obeyed My voice" (vv. 16-19). Not only did God spare Isaac's life, but he provided a substitute sacrifice, foreshadowing God's provision of His only Son as a sacrifice to serve as our substitute for sin on the cross.

When James wrote about faith-empowered works, he used Abraham as an example: "Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered Isaac his son on the altar" (2:21)? When we act and follow God's will for our lives, even when our circumstances make no sense, we follow in the steps of men like Abraham who trusted in God in spite of everything, and were blessed for acting out their faith through trial.
