The Pew Perspective

The true miracle of Christmas is that the Son of God took on human flesh, becoming fully man while retaining His full divinity. "...Christ Jesus, who, being in the form of God...made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and c[ame] in the likeness of men" (Philippians 2:5-7). The incarnation of Jesus Christ as the God-Man was most necessary for Him to serve as our Savior. Anything less would have made Jesus ineligible or unworthy for that task. There are at least eight reasons why it was required for Jesus to be fully God and fully man.

First, Jesus came to serve as a worthy substitute sacrifice for our sins. Just as we are flesh and blood, Jesus, "...like-wise shared in the same, that through death He might destroy him who had the power of death, that is, the devil; ...in all things He had to be made like His brethren, that He might be a merciful and faithful High Priest in things pertaining to God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people" (Hebrews 2:14, 17).

Second, Christ served as a second Adam, obeying and trusting God where the first Adam was disobedient and doubted God's word. "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so also by one Man's obedience many will be made righteous" (Romans 5:19).

Third, Jesus' joint humanity and divinity allows Him to serve as a mediator between man and God. "...there is one God and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus..." (I Timothy 2:5).

Fourth, Jesus' incarnation lets Him fulfill man's dominion over creation. "You have made him a little lower than the angels; You have crowned him with glory and honor, and set him over the works of Your hands. You have put all things in subjection under his feet" (Hebrews 2:7-8).

Fifth, Christ's full humanity permits us to look to Him as an example and pattern in life. "...Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that you should follow His steps: 'Who committed no sin, nor was deceit found in His mouth'" (I Peter 2:21-22).

Sixth, when He rose from the grave as a victorious Savior, Jesus' bodily resurrection served as a pattern for our future redeemed bodies. "...as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly Man" (I Corinthians 15:49).

Seventh, Jesus' experience existing as a man gives Him the ability to sympathize with our shortcomings and limitations. "For we do not have a High Priest who cannot sympathize with our weaknesses, but was in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15).

Lastly, Christ's divinity proves that salvation is from the Lord. "...Alleluia! Salvation and glory and honor and power belong to the Lord our God" (Revelation 19:1)!

Jesus Christ, fully God and man, was sent to us long ago so that He could reveal God's love and salvation to a lost and fallen world, redeem mankind from the power and penalty of sin to life eternal with the Father, and rule over His Kingdom where we can forever call Him, "Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6). What a wonderful Christmas gift!

UMCVFD brings baptism water. Everyone who lives in the Barnesville area tries to conserve water because of the water table problems in this locale. To fill our

baptistery when we observe the ordinance of baptism, i.e. complete immersion of the baptismal candidate, requires about 1000 gallons of water.
