The Pastors' Spotlight

"But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is a chosen vessel of Mine to bear My name before Gentiles, kings, and the children of Israel" (Acts 9:15).

In *Acts 9:15*, the Lord instructed Ananias to help Saul soon after his conversion experience on the road to Damascus. And, as they say, "the rest is history". Saul became the great Apostle Paul who carried the gospel of the risen Christ through Asia, into Europe, and finally to Rome, the city of emperors. He left huge footprints as he ministered and planted churches. At least 13 New Testament books were letters, or epistles, penned by Paul.

In April, longtime BBC member Flora Gilliam embarked on a "Footsteps of Paul" tour. Flora loves the Scriptures and has at one time or another studied all of Paul's writings. So, when the opportunity arose to visit the actual sites of Paul's ministry, she and a friend, Marge, joined Lon Solomon's "In The Footsteps of St. Paul Tour" in Newark, NJ on Apr. 19, beginning an 11-day exciting, strenuous, and exhilarating trip crossing thousands of miles and spanning 2000 years of time. Their first stop was in Philippi (Acts 16:12) where Paul led Lydia to Christ and where he and Silas were thrown into jail (Acts 16:22-34). Flora said the jail was awful, small and dark and rocky. Next they visited sites in Thessalonica and Berea (Acts 17:1-15). In Berea, Flora stood on the same marble synagogue steps where Paul preached. If rocks could talk! Next stop was the ancient city of Corinth where Paul spent 1.5 years in ministry (Acts 18:11). They sailed to the island of Rhodes (Acts 21:1), to the ancient city of Ephesus (Acts 19:1-41), and then to Athens where Paul addressed the philosophers at the Aeropagus (Acts 17:19). The final leg of the trip took them to Rome. They visited the Colosseum where thousands of Christians were martyred for their faith even 300 years after Jesus' resurrection. They also visited St. Paul's Outside the Walls, the great church built over the traditional burial place of the Apostle Paul. Flora returned home to Boyds on Apr. 30, tired, reflective, and appreciative of what God accomplished through His humble servant Paul.

The Pew Perspective

I can tell what season it is by looking at my car. In winter, it is frosted white, covered with road salt. Now that my hood is a lima bean green hue--thanks to the pollen--I know that it is springtime again. (I have heard rumors that my car is actually painted blue). With the natural world just starting up again after months of slumber, it seems too early to begin thinking that this fresh cycle of growth and renewal will conclude in six months. Yet to reap the future harvest, now is the time to sow. This law of the harvest is found throughout Scripture and applies to all sorts of situations, from agriculture to learning how to walk closer with God, from managing your finances to mapping out career goals.

There are four principles in the law of the harvest: you reap *if* you sow, you reap *what* you sow, you reap *after* you sow, and you reap *more* than you sow. God works in our lives according to these principles in most situations most of the time. Although He can always suddenly and miraculously intervene in our lives, we do not normally see God work that way, so it is important to understand the law of the harvest.

First, you reap if you sow. Rewards and blessings are the result of investing your time, energy, and resources towards a goal. Those who do not put forth the required work, sacrifice, and discipline will not receive what they seek. The Psalmist explained that those who are hungry were to, "...sow fields and plant vineyards, that they may yield a fruitful harvest" (Psalm 107:37). In contrast, the Proverbs warn that, "The lazy man will not plow because of winter; He will beg during harvest and have nothing" (Proverbs 20:4).

Second, you reap what you sow. There are many popular sayings that restate this principle: What goes around comes around, what's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander, garbage in/garbage out. The Apostle Paul cautioned the Galatian Christians, "Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, that he will also reap" (Galatians 6:7). Those who spend their energy blessing others and showing forth love will receive the same in return, while those who are selfish and bitter should not be surprised that they do not experience peace and joy in their lives.

Third, you reap after you sow. Although we often expect immediate results, gratification is not instant--all good things come to those who wait. Again, Paul encouraged the Galatians to persevere despite difficulty. "And let us not grow weary while doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart" (Galatians 6:9).

Lastly, you reap more than you sow. No one can outgive or out bless like God, who is, "...a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). Just as for every seed planted a much larger crop is returned, as a result of our faith-driven investment of good works and service to God's Kingdom, we will receive an overflowing return. "...He who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully" (II Corinthians 9:6).

Every Christian who seeks to follow God should strive to live out the law of the harvest. It will only be after a lifetime of Spirit-empowered effort and discipline that we can look back and see how we have grown in Christ-likeness and prospered in the plans and purposes God has set forth for our lives.

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in April:


- The Church accepted the membership applications of Paul Keriakos, Vicki Keriakos, and Ashley Babyak, each by profession of faith pending baptism on April 19.
