The Pastors' Spotlight

"Show me Your ways, O Lord; Teach me Your paths. Lead me in Your truth and teach me, for You are the God of my salvation; On You I wait all the day" (Psalm 25:4-5).

Many of you have had some experience with a GPS device in your car. This is a most helpful tool for getting correct directions to places you may not have been before. Besides the map of the route, the GPS has a voice that gives instructions, e.g. "turn right in 200 yards". These devices are almost always right and very helpful. When the driver of a car using the GPS deviates from the directions given in the map and by the voice, the voice (terrible Tilly to some of us) becomes agitated and "recalculates" directions. The point being, if you do not follow the directions, you may get lost and find yourself in an unknown and strange place. At any rate you will not arrive at your desired destination.

There is for us, on our journey in this life, a direction-finder much superior to the GPS. The Lord God, our Creator and Redeemer, has given us the Bible, a map so to speak, of how to conduct our lives in this world so that we truly enjoy an abundant life and have fellowship with Him. Since we are created in His image, and are therefore moral creatures, the Scriptures teach us right and wrong and lead us to His plan of redemption in Christ. Besides the written Word, there is for believers the indwelling spoken Word, the Holy Spirit. He teaches and instructs, and helps us make good life decisions.

Self-inflicted troubles and suffering come to us when we rebel against God's plan and authority. More than 10 times in the Scriptures, when people challenged Jesus' teaching or His behavior, Jesus said, "Have you not read..." (Matthew 19:4)? When we make decisions hurtful to ourselves or others, we should hear the Lord asking us, "Have you not read the Scripture..." (Matthew 21:42)? Our response should be, "Lord, lead me in Your truth and teach me..." (Psalm 25:5).

The Pew Perspective

Do you know what happens to a corn stalk when it stops growing? The answer is in the fields all around us. The corn is turning brown and dying, having finished its season of growth. All around us the signs of fall are here—shorter days, cooler nights, and hints of autumnal color breaking up the still-dominant green hue of the forest leaves.

For the Christian, we like the corn stalks must also continue to grow, or else face spiritual winter. Throughout the New Testament, the disciples of Jesus Christ are strongly admonished to continue growing and developing in spiritual matters, ever more closely seeking after God. The Apostle Peter wrote in both his letters to continue growing in Christ. In I Peter 2:2, new Christians were urged to, "as newborn babes, desire the pure milk of the word, that you may grow thereby". Peter repeats this admonition for growth in *II Peter 1:5-7*, telling the church to lay hold of God's promises by diligently, "...add/ing| to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge, to knowledge selfcontrol, to self-control perseverance, to perseverance godliness, to godliness brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness love." Peter was challenging the Christians of his day to strain like an athlete at top speed to increase their ability. These elements of growth are to stack on top of one another, building up a Christian in his faith, by which Peter meant a foundational trust and reliance upon Christ for salvation. To be added in an abounding, full, generous, and lavish manner were: *virtue*—the ability to live a morally excellent life of heroic deeds for the Kingdom's benefit:

knowledge—diligent study and pursuit of God's truth in the Scriptures;

self-control—discipline over one's flesh, passions, and desires, being the master over them and not their servant; perseverance—patience and endurance in doing right despite trial and temptation;

godliness—living reverently, loyally, and obediently before God;

brotherly kindness—affection and sacrifice for others; love—self-denying concern and effort for some else's best interests.

Those who fail to grow in this manner Peter warned would be "barren" and "unfruitful" (II Peter 1:8). Jesus Himself first taught the absolute necessity for growth, as He demonstrated in Matthew 21:18-19, cursing the roadside fig tree that had no fruit. Jesus spoke to fig tree, "...Let no fruit grow on you ever again", and immediately thereafter the fig tree withered away. Instead of sitting idle in the spiritual winter of complacency, we are blessed, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to continue growing in Christ all our lives. Let us strive to live such that we, like the Thessalonians, can be "...boast[ed of] among the churches of God..." because our "...faith grows exceedingly..." (II Thessalonians 1:3).
