Then Jesus spoke to them again, "I am the light of the world. He who follows Me shall not walk in darkness, but have the light of life" (John 8:12).

This public rejection is not new to our Lord or to His followers, and will not hinder God's work as He builds His Church in the present world. Do not underestimate the power of your modeling of Christlikeness before others. People notice, and the Holy Spirit will make your witness effective. The world needs the light and the love of Christ. The Pew Perspective

When Jesus stood bound before Pontius Pilate as a prisoner of the Sanhedrin, the Roman governor's first question was, "...are You the King of the Jews" (John 18:33)? Indeed, Pilate was focused on Jesus' royal identity throughout the entire trial, again asking Him, "...are You a king then"? in John 18:37. Although Pilate found no fault with Christ, Jesus' regal status was the reason Pilate sentenced Him to death by crucifixion (John 19:12-13) and was the basis of the charge written on the placard above Jesus' cross (John 19:19). In many ways, Jesus' death was a direct result of His birth, and in some ways, it was surprising that the two events did not occur closer together.

Outside the gospel accounts, history took little note of Christ's birth at the time; the only witnesses present were His parents and the shepherds alerted by the angels. However, before long wise men from the East, most likely astronomer-priests from Persia, arrived at King Herod's palace in Jerusalem asking, "... Where is He who has been born King of the Jews? For we have seen His star in the East and have come to worship Him" (Matthew 2:2). To King Herod, this news represented a mortal threat to his throne, as the Jewish people accepted his rule halfheartedly, Herod being a tool of the Romans and lacking a true Jewish pedigree. Only Joseph's angelic vision spared the infant Jesus from the slaughter ordered by Herod to wipe out the competition, heaven-sent or not.

Despite the alternating indifference and hostility to His arrival, Jesus came as the Prince of Peace, God incarnate, worthy of worship and praise. The Old Testament described the coming Messiah, or Promised One, as a Jewish male born of a virgin, of the tribe of Judah, and a descendant of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. The Messiah would be born in the town of Bethlehem, the city of King David whose heir He would be and whose throne He would inherit and sit on forever. Also, the arrival of the promised Messiah would occur no later than the year 30 A.D.. These descriptions from prophets like Isaiah, Micah, and Daniel allowed Herod's advisors to pinpoint Christ's location for the Magi.

Rejection and ridicule associated with the circumstances of Jesus' birth followed Him throughout His life. His boyhood neighbors in Nazareth scoffed at Jesus' amazing teaching and healing abilities, asking in contempt, "...Is this not the carpenter, the Son of Mary" (Mark 6:3)? The Pharisees and Sadducees similarly made disparaging comments questioning Christ's parentage and legitimacy.

Jesus affirmed His royal status and the heavenly nature of His kingdom in John 18:37, answering Pilate, "... You say rightly that I am a king. For this cause I was born, and for this cause I have come into the world, that I should bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth hears My voice." Instead of ignoring, fearing, or rejecting Christ's royal birth, let us instead take our example from the wise men and our queue from the hymn writer, who invited us to "come and worship, come and worship, worship Christ the newborn King"!
