The Pastor's Spotlight

"Praise the Lord, all you nations; extol Him, all you peoples. For great is His love toward us, and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever. Praise the Lord" (Psalm 117:1-2)!

February is upon us. We are in the midst of a fairly mild winter with little snow, ice, or really cold weather, but we do have short days and long nights. For whatever reason, February has a very bad reputation. Sometimes people find themselves more irritable, moody, or sad, having less energy than normal, or just plain hard to get along with. Doctors have given this condition a name, seasonal affective disorder (SAD). This is a form of mild depression. Maybe some of you have noticed a change in your general outlook on life now that February has arrived. You may be convinced that things will not get much better until spring arrives.

One antidote for SAD that you can try without a prescription is to praise God daily! Praise is an outward expression of internal adoration for the Lord. There are many ways to praise God. In the Old Testament at least seven different words are translated "praise". These descriptors help us understand what praise may look like. You can praise God with extended or uplifted hands; sing songs of thanksgiving; meditate on God's holiness and goodness; dance or clap your hands; read or sing the *Psalms*; allow your spirit to be joyful in the Lord; and gather with your faith family and sing praises at every opportunity. And according to one Hebrew word, you can be "clamorously foolish". This effective antidote can be used when you are happy or sad, when things are good or when things stink. Praise is the vehicle that allows us to open ourselves to the Lord without inhibitions, conditions, or expectations, just heartfelt praise, gratitude, and thanksgiving to a holy and righteous God who loves us. Praise is an act of the will. For God's help with the SAD times in your life, commit to praise Him and then allow Him to bring His peace and joy to your life. "Every day I will praise you and extol your name forever and ever" (Psalm 145:2).

The Pew Perspective

Have you considered how long-lasting decisions can be? Pastor Randy and I were talking about the upcoming new year in late December, and he asked me if I thought the new year of 2012 would be a better year than 2011 was. My answer was that I wasn't sure that 2012 would be much of an improvement, because all the same people that were in 2011 making decisions would be around for the start of 2012. Although many people like to celebrate the first day of the first month as a dividing line between the past and the future, our state of affairs on January 1 looks a lot like it did on December 31 because the decisions of the past have led us to where we are in the present and affect where we will be in the future.

The Bible references many instances where the power and reach of our choices are obvious. Part of being created in the Lord's image is our capacity to exercise will and make real decisions that have permanent consequences, be they good or bad. For example, while in the land of Moab, Moses again charged the children of Israel to obey their covenant promises to the Lord. Reminding them that they would be blessed if they obeyed God, but cursed if they were disobedient, Moses said, "...I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore choose life, that both you and your descendants may live ... " (Deuteronomy 30:19). It is significant that people not only make decisions that affect themselves, but also the generations that come after them. The Lord described Himself to Moses as both merciful and just, "... visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children and the children's children to the third and the fourth generation..." (Exodus 34:7). With this verse in mind, it is fascinating to consider that if a generation is 30 years, that for more than a century someone's decisions could ripple across time. In your own lives, consider how decisions made by people before you were even born shaped the course of your life. None of us had a say on what our name is, where we were born and raised, or what language we learned to speak.

One of the most significant decisions in human history was the decision by Adam and Eve to not trust or obey the Lord's requirement to avoid just one tree in Eden. Their sin severed not just their spiritual relationship with God, but also imparted to their descendants a sin nature hostile to knowing or seeking God. It wasn't until Jesus served as a model of obedience that the consequences of Adam's actions could be reversed. Paul explained it this way: "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so also by one Man's obedience many will be made *righteous"* (Romans 5:19). What a blessing it is to know that as powerful and consequential as our ability to make decisions is, the Lord's ability to show us mercy and grace for His glory's sake is so much more abounding. As we continue through 2012, and toward 2013, 2014, and how ever many more years the Lord has allotted for us, let us consider the great responsibility that comes with the gift to make decisions.

Interview with a Short-Term Missionary Larry Michael

- * Why did you start participating in short-term missions activities? I first participated at the request of my brother who attends Redland Baptist, to use my construction skills to help my fellow brothers in Christ.
- * Where have you gone on your short-term mission trips? What projects and activities did you participate in during your visits? I went to Gulfport, Mississippi twice to work on Hurricane Katrina reconstruction projects, helping to build a battered women's shelter and wire houses. In New Orleans, I put up drywall in a woman's home after Hurricane Katrina. I have gone to Hato Mayor in the Dominican Republic three times, where I have done electrical work and carpentry at small village churches and local homes.
- * How have the mission trips impacted your Christian walk? The mission trips have reinforced my belief that you should help others with the gifts the Lord has given you and that there is a blessing in service to others.
- * What is the most important thing you have learned or experienced serving as short-term missionary? There can be joy even in the midst of hardships for people who truly love the Lord.
- * What preparations were needed to successfully travel to and serve at the mission locations? In Gulfport and New Orleans, we needed to prepare VBS supplies and lessons beforehand, and assemble tools for construction. To travel to the Dominican Republic, we needed to get passports and vaccinations in advance of our trip. In addition to the VBS and construction supplies we used, we also had medical and dental teams that needed to collect medicines, toothbrushes, vitamins, personal hygiene items, and eyeglasses to provide medical care to the people we met.
- ★ What advice would you give to someone thinking about participating in a short-term mission trip or activity? Pray about getting involved, then trust the Lord to direct your path. Everyone has a gift for service--VBS teacher, construction worker, medical assistant, kitchen helper, music leader or just as an extra pair of hands--there is always something to do if one is willing.
- * What steps would you recommend BBC take as a congregation to prepare for sending out its own team of short-term missionaries in the future? I would recommend BBC leadership and/or interested members accompany another church mission trip to see what is involved.

Go paperless in 2012. BBC is now offering the Lantern in electronic format to those would prefer such an option instead of a copy sent by mail. If you would like to receive a monthly email with a link to the Lantern, please send an email to our masthead address. Those who wish to continue receiving a paper copy of the Lantern will continue to receive one; no further action is required. While back copies of the Lantern are always available on the BBC website, the calendar is for the current month only.

Historian's update. Log onto the BBC website's church history page to find an online record of newspaper articles about BBC, its members, and pastors beginning in the 1830s up to the present day. A digital copy of the old minutes, covering the first 60-odd years of BBC history, is available through the church office. The early minutes contain the 1871 church covenant signed by the founding members, the 1882 articles of incorporation, records of 19th-century business meetings, and membership rolls until 1943. We are also starting to digitize old pictures; we have 250 pictures from 1995-1997 newly available.

Building improvements. Vall Boring of Steeples Plus has



been busy the past few weeks, making the exterior of Barnesville Baptist ready for the next several decades. For several days in late December, the front façade of BBC sported a light green hue, the base color of the concrete fiberboard that will replace the old wood clapboard

siding.
Originally
tasked to
paint the

church's exterior, Vall discovered after scraping that most of the 1980s-era wood was deteriorated. The sanctuary window frames were showing their age too, and needed to be replaced. The new front façade matches very well with the original wood, now that it has been primed white. The new sanctuary windows are very similar to the old ones as well, especially with the new shutters installed. Springtime plans
