## The Pastor's Spotlight

"Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts according to the grace given us" (Romans 12:4-6).

To say that the human body is amazingly complex would be a striking understatement. The members—limbs, internal organs, and body parts—that allow the body to function as one unit are myriad. Limbs allow us to move, grasp, kick and throw. Internal organs keep blood flowing, digest food, give us balance and structure, breath oxygen in and out, and make thinking, reasoning, singing, and worshipping possible. More visible body parts give us the ability to see, hear, smell, taste, and touch the world around us. Though these members are different in size and shape, they work together to allow the body to function and to work and at play. There is extreme diversity in design and purpose of the body's members just as there is extreme unity among the all members in allowing the body to function as one organism. No wonder Paul compared the church, those in Christ, to the human body. The diversity in the church is worldwide: "... With your blood you purchased men for God from every tribe and language and people and nation..." (Revelation 5:9). There is not only diversity of members but also diversity of gifts: preaching, teaching, serving, encouraging, giving, leading, showing mercy, praying, peacemaking, evangelism, prophecy, and others. In Christ, the church forms one body. It is the task of the unified church, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to take God's love to the world and to share the gospel of life with every person. "Make us one, Lord, make us one!"

#### The Pew Perspective

Are you ready for battle? The Apostle Paul instructed the church at Ephesus to be ready for spiritual warfare. Even though Jesus defeated Satan on the cross, evil is still present and powerful in the world today. However, we are to "...be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might" (Ephesians 6:10) because the final victory shall be Christ's when He strips evil of all its influence and banishes it to hell. Jesus promised His followers, "...the gates of Hades shall not prevail against [My church]" (Matthew 16:18). The church of Jesus Christ is not defending a castle under siege, it is to storm and overcome evil's strongholds.

In order to prepare for battle, warding off temptations and fighting the good fight of faith throughout your life (*I Timothy 1:18; 6:12; II Timothy 4:7*), you must dress for success. Paul used the elements of a Roman soldier's armor to lay out to the Ephesian Christians, and to us today, how to prepare for life's spiritual challenges in *Ephesians 6:14-17*.

The first piece of gear is the belt of truth to tuck in the loose ends of life so they don't tangle us up. As it says in *I Corinthians 13:11*, as mature Christians, we are to put away childish things.

Next is the breastplate of righteousness to protect your heart and other vital organs. The most important asset a Christian has in dealing with the world is an unimpeachable testimony that comes by living with holiness. A role model in this regard is Job, whom God called blameless, and who maintained his integrity despite intense persecution (*Job 1:1, 8*).

Footwear is important when traversing rough terrain. Paul recommended wearing the shoes of preparation of the gospel of peace. Just as the Roman soldiers wore boots with nail cleats for traction, we are to withstand all that comes before us, unlike the man who built upon the "sinking sand" of *Matthew 7:26-27.* 

Next came the shield of faith, which was trust in God. The Roman version was large enough to protect the entire body, just as trusting in God would defend against the fiery darts of temptation. The "shield of faith" is first found in *Psalm 18:2*, which David wrote to celebrate God's deliverance of him from Saul. For David, God Himself was his shield in a very personal way.

Protecting the head is the helmet of salvation, which gives us the assurance of salvation, defending against doubt and discouragement that God loves us and has saved us forever. We can be sure that our salvation is permanent because it is "…sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, who is the guarantee of our inheritance…" (Ephesians 1:13-14).

Finally, the properly armed Christian carries with him the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God. It is the only offensive weapon listed or needed. Consider the power of Scripture to defeat our spiritual adversaries in *Matthew 4*, when Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness for 40 days and nights. Each time Satan came against Jesus, He defended Himself by going to the Scripture: "It is written...." Biblical truth is so potent we cannot be effective Christians without a deep familiarity with and constant exposure to God's Word.

Suit up! The battle is ongoing, and the Captain of your Salvation calls you to join the fray (Hebrews 2:10).

#### Interview with the Lantern Staff

★ Why did you decide to start a church newsletter?

Randy: Members and friends of BBC make up a faith family and, just as in biological families, communication is important. The *Lantern* communicates many things: it teaches and encourages from Scripture; informs about church activities and schedules; keeps those needing prayer in the minds of people; highlights activities and ministries; celebrates baptisms, births and other special events; and recognizes people's service.

★ What are some of the most challenging and rewarding aspects of writing the Lantern?

Randy: There are two particularly challenging aspects of writing the *Lantern*. One is having a certainty that what is written has been prayed about and is accurate or consistent with baptistic beliefs and sensitive to the people's needs. The other is meeting a deadline! As a world-class procrastinator at times, I depend on the friendly, monthly reminders by the editor about the publishing date. In 10 years, we have never missed a month. The rewarding aspects of writing for the *Lantern* are the comments and feedback we receive from those who have been blessed by what had been written or who expressed gratitude for receiving church news.

Lee: As Editor, I need to make sure we keep on schedule as we approach the printing deadline. This requires some careful planning especially when Randy and Sandy or I am out of town. I am also responsible for proofreading--luckily the *Lantern* has never made a mistake, ever. When we put out a smart-looking newsletter with original content for the members of Barnesville Baptist each month, it gives me a feeling of accomplishment.

★ What is the most important thing you have learned or experienced in the last 10 years as a member of the Lantern staff?

Randy: I have learned that it is possible for a team of different people to work together for many years in harmony when they have the common, worthwhile goal of serving the Lord Jesus and His church.

Lee: I have come to learn that the people of BBC serve the Lord in many different ways, using their varying gifts to serve in a broad range of ministries. I have also found that our newsletter reaches a broad audience, especially through the BBC website.

★ What does it take to print and mail each month's Lantern?

Sandy: It takes about three hours to print and fold and another 1 1/2 hours to apply the mailing seals. Nancy Cooley devoted many Saturday evenings over many years to add the seals and Ralph took the finished product to the post office. Recently, Suzanne Neal has volunteered to take on this part of the process. What a blessing it is to have church family willing to help in the production of the *Lantern*.

# **Business Meeting Briefs**

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in May:

The Historian budget line item was increased by \$200.

Expected at the June Business Meeting:

- The Internal Administration Cmte. will recommend accepting the Steeples Plus bid to install and paint concrete fiberboard on all remaining untreated walls and to paint and install shutters and increasing the Physical Plant budget line item by \$33,000 to cover the new spending.
- A motion to increase the Historian budget line item by \$200 will be offered by the Internal Administration Cmte.
- A motion to move the July Business meeting to June 27 so as not to conflict with Independence Day will be offered.

#### Expected at the July Business Meeting:

- A motion will be made to call for the Standing Committees to authorize Church officer and committee positions for the 2012-2014 term.
- The Pastor will announce the members who will serve on the Nominating Committee to select 2012-2014 officers.
