The Pastor's Spotlight

Jesus, Messiah, Son of God, Son of Man, Savior, Prince of Peace, the Way, the Truth, and the Life, the Light of the World and the Bread of Life: this is whose birth we celebrate at Christmas time and to whom we offer praise and worship all during the year. Each year we thrill at Luke's account of the angel Gabriel coming to Mary with that astonishing news: "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the Holy One to be born will be called the Son of God" (Luke 1:35). Then in *Luke 2:10-11* the angel proclaimed the good news that prophets and kings had wanted for centuries to hear, "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; He is Christ the Lord". When Jesus was presented in the Temple in Jerusalem the news of the Savior's birth was affirmed by Simeon, a righteous and devout man moved by the Holy Spirit. Simeon took the infant Jesus in his arms and praised God saying, "Sovereign Lord, as You have promised, You now dismiss Your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen Your salvation, which You have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to Your people *Israel*" (*Luke 2:29-32*). Christmas is a good time to begin to re-read the gospels and get reacquainted with this Jesus, His teachings, His love for people, His amazing works, His brutal death, and His glorious resurrection, all of which are the fulfillment of prophecy. Then go to *Colossians 1:15* and read the Apostle Paul's description of Jesus: "He is the image of the invisible God ... by Him all things were created... He is before all things and in Him all things hold together...For God was pleased to have all fullness dwell in Him, and through Him to reconcile to Himself all things...by making peace through His blood, shed on the cross." Amen and amen.

How far would you travel to see something amazing? A parade, a presidential motorcade, a fireworks display, or a movie star, perhaps? What if that something wonderful was only five or six miles from your home? For some perspective, from Barnesville Boyds is 4.5 miles to the east. Hyattstown and Poolesville are six miles to the north and south. Dickerson to the west is barely three miles away. Would it be too hard for you to find the time and the energy to travel to any of those locations to see something that might change your very life? For many people in Jerusalem nearly 2,000 years ago, the answer was "no". The destination would have been Bethlehem, a quiet village only five or six miles to the south of Israel's capital city. However, when wise men from the East visited King Herod and asked about the whereabouts of "...He who has been born King of the Jews..." (Matthew 2:2), the reaction of most was far from positive. Herod, a non-Jew who earned his title of Jewish king by serving as a Roman stooge, was first frightened at the news, before turning angry. When he asked those who knew the answer, the chief priests and scribes, Herod received a ready answer from the religious establishment straight out of Micah 5:2 identifying Bethlehem of Judea as the birthplace of the "...Ruler who will shepherd My people Israel["] (Matthew 2:6). However, for those who knew where to go to find the promised Messiah, anticipated since the Garden of Eden and God's promises to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, the announcement of that divine arrival barely merited a yawn, much less a downhill stroll to see what all the fuss was about.

Herod, after gaining his composure, sought out the rightful King's location only to slaughter Him like a rival political opponent. When Jesus told His followers in John 15:18 that "If the world hates you, you know that it hated Me before it hated you", Herod was just the first of many to oppose Him. Only those who had the farthest to travel actually made the last leg of the journey to see the "young Child". No one knows their names or their number, but those visitors who came from such a long distance were among the few who were actually happy to see the newborn King. Even the sight of the Christmas star, which beckoned them near, brought the wise men "exceedingly great joy" (Matthew 2:10). When the wise men finally did encounter Christ face to face, they "fell down and worshiped Him, [and] opened their treasures": gold fit for a king, frankincense fit for a priest, and myrrh fit for a sacrifice-foreshadows of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection (Matthew 2:11).

Jesus' birth brought *"good news"* according to *Luke 2*. Don't let fear, indifference, or anger ruin your Christmas like it did for Herod and the priest and scribes. Be instead like the wise men from afar who came near and received God's gift of "exceeding great joy".

Business Meeting Briefs

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in November:

- The Church approved a motion to increase the 2012 budget line item for Office Supplies by \$1,000.
- The Pastor has accepted the resignation of Larry Michael as Deacon, for cause, effective November 3, 2012.

Expected at the December Business Meeting:

• The Finance Committee will offer a motion to approve its 2013 budget. The proposed budget amount of \$195,141 is \$112,120 less than the 2012 adjusted budget amount of \$307,261, which to date includes over \$6,000 in Cooperative Program giving beyond the minimum budgeted amount of \$10,000.

BCM/D annual meeting report. BBC messengers Randy & Sandy Gilliam attended the state convention Nov. 11-13, which was hosted by Global Mission Church in Silver Spring, MD. The theme for the 2012 meeting was "We Can't Stop: Speaking, Serving, Praying, Loving, Pursuing". There were 260 messengers and 96 visitors registered. Speakers at this annual meeting included Kevin Ezell, President of the North American Mission Board, Ken Stalls, President of the BCM/D and pastor of South End Baptist Church, Frederick, MD, Vaughn Walker, pastor from Louisville, KY, Chuck Lawless, Dean of Graduate Studies for SE Baptist Theological Seminary, and David Lee, Executive Director of BCM/D. Dr. Lee announced to the messengers that he is retiring, effective July 2013.
