The Pastor's Spotlight

"Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom'. Jesus answered him, 'I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in paradise'" (Luke 23:42-43).

A great truth we learn in the account of Jesus' death on the cross came in an exchange between Jesus and a criminal crucified beside Him. The criminal believed that Jesus could help him. He had no doubt heard about the miracles and the teachings of this innocent man being crucified unfairly. The criminal was just hours away from death by crucifixion which he deserved because of his crimes. His legs would be broken so that he would suffocate and die quickly. At this moment of decision, this thief expressed faith in who Jesus was and with that simple faith asked the Lord to remember him when He came into His kingdom. This was a plea for undeserved mercy from a desperate man wanting to repent of the evils he had committed in his life. Jesus' response to him was a great confirmation of what Jesus had taught about everlasting life and the place prepared for those who trust in Him. Jesus told the thief, "Today you will be with me in paradise".

If Jesus were not God's Son, such a statement would be laughable. But, consider who Jesus had proven Himself to be. The wind and the waves obeyed His voice. The lame walked and the lepers were healed. A young girl who died got up and ate at His command. At the Lord's command Lazarus came out of the tomb alive after being buried for four days. The man born blind obeyed Jesus' command to go and wash in the Pool of Siloam and he came home seeing. Jesus' works, the Hebrew prophets, and God the Father all testified that Jesus was the Son of God. He had the authority and the power to grant forgiveness and life and a home in paradise to the repentant criminal. The "whosoever" of John 3:16 included the thief on the cross just as it includes you and me. Charles Wesley's lyrics from "And Can It Be" express the only appropriate reaction: "Amazing love! How can it be, that Thou, my God, should die for me."

The Pew Perspective

What, I have often wondered, would have happened if Jesus hadn't called out Lazarus by name when He raised the four-days-dead man from the grave? As recorded by the Apostle John, when Jesus approached the rock-sealed tomb of His good friend, He prayed out loud and then, "...He cried with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come forth'" (John 11:43)! Lazarus then came out from the tomb, still wrapped in his burial garments, alive and well to the amazement of the great crowd that witnessed the miracle. However, what if Jesus hadn't specified Lazarus' name, and just called out "come forth"? My suspicion is that every grave within earshot would have been emptied by the command of the Resurrection and the Life.

We do know that one day every grave will be emptied and every soul will come before God. Jesus told His followers that He would call forth the righteous and the unrighteous at the judgment. "Most assuredly, I say to you, the hour is coming, and now is, when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God; and those who hear will live" (John 5:25). Those who put saving faith in Christ will be resurrected unto eternal life, but those who remain in their sins will be resurrected for judgment and punishment.

So, in many ways, Jesus' resurrection of Lazarus was a warm-up session. Lazarus lived but two miles outside of Jerusalem in the town of Bethany, where it was quite easy for those assembled for Passover to investigate the claim that the teacher from Nazareth had brought someone back from the grave. They could see Lazarus face to face and talk to his sisters Mary and Martha, as well as those who had attended the funeral and sealed Lazarus' dead body into its tomb. Many people came to the conclusion that Jesus wasn't just a prophet or a rabbi or a healer, but was in fact the longawaited Messiah. "Then many of the Jews who had come to Mary, and had seen the things Jesus did, believed in Him" (John 11:45). The religious authorities from the Temple as well as the Pharisees also came and saw the same evidence. Instead of praising God and responding in faith, they were concerned with maintaining their power and privilege. They didn't want to celebrate Lazarus' miraculous recovery, but rather wanted to kill him so Jesus would not be recognized as the Son of God. "But the chief priests plotted to put Lazarus to death also, because on account of him many of the Jews went away and believed in Jesus" (John 12:10-11).

The High Priest Caiaphas and the other religious leaders from that time also began to plot Jesus' death, with the high priest recommending, "...it is expedient for us that one man should die for the people, and not that the whole nation should perish" (John 11:50). Caiaphas didn't understand the implications of his own words, for Jesus would surely die for the Jewish people, and indeed all mankind, so that they would not perish in their sins, but that through God's grace they would receive forgiveness of sins and eternal life through faith in Christ's redeeming sacrifice on the cross. Practice truly made us perfect.

Interview with the Women's Rally Speaker Gayla Parker

- * How did you first hear about BBC? Joyce called and invited me to come and speak at the first Women's Rally. I'm not sure where she got my name but I'm certainly glad she called. That first year the topic was "Leaving a Legacy". She had the women bring things to display in the fellowship hall that represented their families' legacies. I remember several of the ladies had quilts. We looked at women who had changed the lives of others: *Proverbs 31*, Esther changed a family, Huldah changed a nation. I fell in love with the church the first visit...everything about it.
- * Where are you currently serving? I'm serving as women's ministry leader and pastor's wife at Lifeway Baptist Church in Little Rock. I'm also writing and teaching for WMU and Lifeway (I'll be doing a webcast for Lifeway this week that will be aired in August). I'm also taking speaking engagements for women's events as much as possible. I love teaching women and challenging us all to dig deeper in learning and serving. I'm also doing a little writing and editing for the Arkansas Baptist State paper. Hopefully by summer I will be enrolled in seminary to work toward a Ph.D. program.
- * How did you know you were called into the ministry? For those who have heard my story, you know that my background is pretty messy but yet God still loved me. I knew that there were a lot of young girls with messed up families and lives that may never hear that God loves them. If God could change my life then certainly He could change theirs. After the first time I led someone to the Lord, I knew that was how God wanted to use my story.
- * What is the most important thing you have learned or experienced in your ministry? The importance of staying close to God and keeping the focus on HIM. It is easy to substitute preparation for teaching for your own quiet time. While God has spoken to me in many ways in the midst of preparing, that is not a substitute for having a quiet time and prayer time a part from my preparing. If that gets out of balance then God is not at the center of what I do. The Bible has some serious consequences for a teacher out of balance. I'm very intentional in regards to my own spiritual growth and keeping my heart in tune to the way in which the Holy Spirit is teaching, leading, AND convicting.
