The Pew Perspective

The Washington Post published on Sept. 26 an article entitled "Five myths about Jesus" by Reza Aslan, the latest celebrity religious scholar-author to step into the media limelight with a book about the "legends and myths" that have obscured the "real" Jesus of history over the centuries. Aslan claims in his article that the following statements about Jesus are myths, fancifully or falsely invented by early Christians to round out their biography of Jesus: (1) Jesus was born in Bethelem, (2) Jesus was an only child, (3) Jesus had 12 disciples, (4) Jesus had a trial before Pontius Pilate, and (5) Jesus was buried in a tomb.

Considering and responding to claims like these are a great opportunity to hone your apologetics skills: "...always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you..." (I Peter 3:15). Debunking the claims in the article is not too hard if you remember that the Bible counts as a historical record, as well as being familiar with what the Bible actually says, not how someone slants it.

Aslan's first claimed myth is based on the argument that there is no record of the census described in *Luke 1* that sent Joseph & Mary from Nazareth to Bethlehem. But wait, what about *Luke 1*? What Aslan is really saying is that the already available evidence of an otherwise historically unimportant bureaucratic order from 2,000 years ago isn't good enough for him, and that despite the ravages of time, wars, fires, and the rise and fall of civilizations, he would like even more evidence to exist than what has survived.

Myth two is only controversial to those who believe in the Catholic doctrine of Mary's perpetual virginity, so it's really not worthy of a top five list. In fact, two of Jesus' brothers, James and Jude, wrote epistles that are included as books of the New Testament.

Myth three is also trivial and relies on the fact that people often interchange the words "disciples" and "apostles". The Gospels record that Jesus had many disciples, or followers, but only a dozen inner-circle men who were given leadership roles in the Church, the apostles. This "myth" is nothing more than a complaint about word usage.

Aslan claims for his fourth and fifth myths that the Romans wouldn't have given Jesus special treatment like a trial or a burial. This is where the knowing what the Bible says helps out, as the Scripture explains why Jesus' death and burial played out as they did. The Gospels reveal that Jesus wasn't a Roman prisoner. Christ was arrested by the Temple authorities, who brought Him before the Roman governor and whipped up the Passover crowds so the death penalty, a punishment only the Romans could authorize, would be imposed. Also, it's true a poor, itinerant preacher like Jesus normally wouldn't have been buried in a rock-hewn tomb, but as the Gospels explain, the rich and influential Joseph of Arimathea persuaded Pontius Pilate to give him custody of Jesus' body.

Aslan is not the first and won't be the last to criticize the historical accuracy of the Bible or the truth it presents about Jesus. We therefore as Christ's representatives must continue to be ready to defend the Scripture's trustworthiness.

Missions Focus: Montgomery County Correctional Facility

For several years BBC has made monthly donations as part of its support to missions to the Good News Jail & Prison Ministry to support the ministry of Rev. Russ Isler, the chaplain at Montgomery County Correctional Facility (MCCF) in nearby Clarksburg, Maryland. Chaplain Isler's mission is to "present the Gospel of Jesus to the men and women" at MCCF. Through his own preaching, teaching, and counseling, and with the help of many volunteers, the men and women incarcerated at MCCF have the "opportunity to encounter the life-giving power of Jesus Christ."

Chaplain Isler began his involvement with jail ministry as a volunteer. He was moved by the fact that some people he interacted with in jail were young men he had gone to school with years earlier, saying, "how blessed I am and but by the grace of God I could be an inmate". Because Chaplain Isler knew the background of many of these inmates, he understood how critical the need was to take the good news of the Gospel into the jails. With the help of volunteers and support by many churches the MCCF jail ministry now includes Bible study classes, worship services, the distribution of Bibles and Christian literature, Bible correspondence courses, one-on-one counseling, and aftercare ministry for those who are released from MCCF.

A great joy of Chaplain Isler's ministry is seeing how God's power can completely change people's lives. Some time ago a woman enslaved to drugs and alcohol and burdened with guilt and shame happened to read the account of the Samaritan woman in *John 4*. God began to speak to her and as volunteers began to share that text she experienced God's forgiveness and His cleansing which washed away all of her sin. She began to know the joy and peace that only comes by grace through faith in the blood of Jesus Christ. God's power to "demolish strongholds" of evil is truly on display in this place of so much spiritual darkness. "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:10).

With an average daily population of around 700 at MCCF, the chaplain's work is never done. Rev. Isler is very appreciative of the prayer and financial support provided by Barnesville Baptist through its missions giving. "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for Me" (Matthew 25:40).
