The Pastor's Spotlight

"Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again; Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

One of the wonderful things about November is that the goodness of being thankful is openly admitted and practiced. Being thankful, feeling gratitude in your heart puts you on the path that leads into God's presence. "Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise; give thanks to Him and praise His name" (Psalm 100:4-5). When we consider God's goodness and all that He has done for us, we should be overwhelmed with the desire to give Him thanks and to praise Him. He has extended His grace and mercy to bring us salvation; He knows us by name; He knows the things we need even before we ask; He has forgotten our sins; He is with us every second of every minute of every hour in this life; and, He has prepared a place for us to be with Him eternally!

The Pew Perspective

As the Pastor's Spotlight notes on page 1, Thanksgiving is indeed a time for public thankfulness to the Lord for His many favors and blessings that we have enjoyed throughout the year. The Lord sends some of His blessings to all men because of His grace and mercy: "...He makes His sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust" (Matthew 5:45). Although God is fatherly toward His creation, He is only Father to those who believe in Him. There are greater blessings in store for those who are the children of God. We see this clearly in Matthew 5:1-12, where Jesus lays out those who are due blessings from God. The Beatitudes identify eight types of people who will receive God's blessings for their character and Christlikeness.

"The poor in spirit" (v. 3). This type of poverty is not about how much money you have, but realizing that you should be humble before God because without Him you would be spritually bankrupt. "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick...I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance" (Matthew 9:12-13).

"Those who mourn" (v. 4) is a common verse used at funerals, and it is indeed true that God will heal our broken hearts. However, Jesus was really talking about having sorrow before God for one's sins that leads to repentance and salvation without regret--the best comfort of all. "For godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation, not to be regretted; but the sorrow of the world produces death" (II Corinthians 7:10).

"Meekness" (v. 5) means not weakness, but submissiveness to God's will, being teachable and considerate. Jesus quoted *Psalm 37:11* when He promised the meek their blessing: "But the meek shall inherit the earth, and shall delight themselves in the abundance of peace".

"Those who hunger and thirst for righteousness" (v. 6) are those who seek righteousness from God and don't assume, like the Pharisees, that they are deserving of God's favor. "For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and seeking to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted to the righteousness of God" (Romans 10:3).

"The merciful" (v. 7) are those who extend grace and forgiveness to others as God gave it to them. "For judgment is without mercy to the one who has shown no mercy. Mercy triumphs over judgment" (James 2:13).

"The pure in heart" (v. 8) will enjoy God's presence through faith and finally by sight. "...His servants shall serve Him. They shall see His face, and His name shall be on their foreheads" (Revelation 22:3-4).

"Peacemakers" (v. 9) have God-given tranquility that lets their witness show forth. "Pursue peace with all people, and holiness, without which no one will see the Lord..." (Hebrews 12:14).

"Those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake" (v. 10), will partake in Christ's suffering and glory. "Rejoice to the extent that you partake of Christ's sufferings...If you are reproached for the name of Christ, blessed are you, for the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you" (I Peter 4:12-14). In all these cases, these blessed receive what they give to others, are adopted into God's family, and will inherit His

Kingdom. How thankful are we that these blessings are ours.

- The Church approved the membership application of Zachary Fedders by profession of faith and baptism on Sept. 29.
- An Outreach Committee motion to transfer \$3,000 from the Missions Trip budget line item to the Outreach budget line item was approved.

Two book resources to help parents, teachers, and churches protect their families are: *Not In My Town* and *Refuse To Do Nothing*. Sadly, 30% of human trafficking is committed by a victim's family members.

Zack join our church family!


