The Pew Perspective

Faith, the spiritual ability to believe and trust in God, is often described in terms of believing without evidence or proof. Thomas the doubting apostle only believed after seeing the risen Savior, and Jesus commended those who would not see Him in the flesh: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed" (John 20:29). While not seeing is certainly an important aspect of faith, it is also rooted in what we do know--not about the future, but about God. Paul explained to Timothy that his confidence in the Lord was based on what Paul knew about the God he trusted. "...I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He *is able..." (II Timothy 1:12).* Paul had strong faith because he had a strong personal knowledge of his Lord and Savior. Paul knew that the Lord was strong and loving and forgiving because he had experienced the Lord's power on the Damascus road and received mercy instead of punishment through the ministry of Ananias and Christian brethren in Damascus.

Many others throughout the pages of Scripture had strong faith because they knew something about the God they had faith in. Abraham, who had received blessings by obeying God's call to leave all that he knew and seek out an unknown home, was willing to carry out God's unusual request to sacrifice his only son. If God had promised Abraham descendants through Isaac, then Abraham trusted that even Isaac's death would not prevent that ironclad promise from being fulfilled, "...concluding that God was able to raise him up, even from the dead" (Hebrews 11:19).

David, the shepherd boy who became king, was able to write verses like *"But the Lord has been my defense, and my God the rock of my refuge" (Psalm 94:22)* because he had enjoyed God's protection and provision from danger and adversity.

Peter, who ran away in fear at Jesus' arrest, came back in power and boldness to publicly preach Jesus to the crowds at Pentecost. Such an amazing turnaround was rooted in Peter's firsthand knowledge of His resurrected Savior. Peter explained in his first epistle that he was a *"witness of the sufferings of Christ, and also a partaker of the glory that will be revealed" (I Peter 5:1).*

So we too have faith in the Lord because of what we know about Him and what we have experienced of Him. We learn in the Bible that God is a good, almighty, and loving Creator. With that knowledge, our heavenly Father can nurture our faith so that we can accept His salvation through Jesus Christ. God continues to build up our faith through the Holy Spirit so that we can mature as Christians, experiencing trials and His constant provision that allows us to overcome. It is that same process of building faith that allowed Job, who suffered tragedy and severe trials for no apparent reason, to say about God: "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him" (Job 13:15). And we know that Job's faith was vindicated when God gave him back double everything he had lost. If you feel your faith is at low tide, then go back through the Scriptures to learn more about the Lord who is the object of your faith. Review your past to recall the times that God was faithful to you. Strengthen your knowledge of God and your faith in Him will become stronger.

- The Church elected Rev. Danny Moore as Pastor, effective Sept. 1, 2015, by a vote of 41-0.


