The Pew Perspective

How would you respond to an encounter with God's Word? When King Josiah of Judah had such an experience, he led his nation to spiritual revival in 622 B.C. Josiah's ancestors had participated in and encouraged idol worship in Judah. Instead of following God, those wicked kings profaned the Temple by allowing idols and temple prostitutes in Jerusalem and child sacrifice upon mountaintop altars to false gods. In II Kings 22, faithful priests rediscovered God's Word during repairs to the Temple and gave King Josiah those scrolls to read. When Josiah read the Law for himself and learned that God would judge Judah for its sin (v. 18), the king displayed a tender heart and a humble spirit before the Lord and repented of his country's sins (v. 19). In response, God heard Josiah's plea (v. 19) and promised to spare the king from witnessing Judah's future judgment. Indeed, Josiah lived out his days in peace (v. 20).

Josiah's walk with God didn't stop with reading the scroll of the Law. In *II Kings 23*, Josiah went out to rid Judah of all the trappings of idolatry. He led people to take a stand for God's Word (*v. 3*) and cleaned out evil from their worship (*v. 4*) and their nation (*vv. 5-24*). Josiah tore down altars, smashed graven images, and drove out false priests. For his steadfast devotion to God's will, Josiah was known as man of God like no other (*v. 25*).

Josiah's deeds are instructive on so many levels. First, Josiah's reaction to God's Word is a model of personal salvation. We too must learn from God's Word that we are estranged from Him because of our sin and deserve to face His just and righteous judgment. However, when we repent of our sins and ask the Lord for mercy, we will receive His grace and can live in peace with Him.

Second, Josiah's story inspires us to seek revival within ourselves, our church, and our nation. After Josiah got his own heart right with God, he led others to do the same. He started in Jerusalem, restoring God's Temple with the elders, priests, and people of the city and then worked his way out to cleanse the entire nation. When we seek to follow God, our strengthened walk will strengthen our families' walks. Families strong for the Lord will in turn strengthen the local church. When strong congregations are bold for the Lord, we are in position for God to move among His people and use us to share His love among our neighbors, friends, and country.

We have two great opportunities to put Josiah's example into practice this month. On May 5, we can pray for our families, church, and country on the National Day of Prayer. The theme verse for this annual event is *II Chronicles 7:14*, which tells us that spiritual revival comes when God's people turn back to Him. The Lord is looking not to the unsaved, but to His own, for repentance and rededication. Only when believers seek after God will He shower all the land with His blessings. As Pastor Danny noted in this month's Pastor Spotlight, our May 20-22 revival services will be a time when we can renew our focus on the Lord and His will for our lives. Follow Josiah's example and allow God to revive your spirit and draw you closer to Him.
