The Pew Perspective

One of the best things about the Christmas story is that it didn't end with Jesus staying in the manger. Instead, He grew up: "And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men" (Luke 2:52). Jesus lived just like us, experiencing growth--mentally (wisdom), physically (stature), spiritually (favor with God), and socially (favor with men). We shouldn't remain spiritual infants, but develop into mature Christian believers as Jesus modeled for us.

First, like Jesus, we should grow in wisdom, not just book knowledge, but the ability to apply it in practical ways to walk in God's truth. At the age of 12, the young Jesus impressed the teachers at the Temple with His knowledge: "...all who heard Him were astonished at His understanding and answers" (Luke 2:47). We should join in Paul's prayer that the Father would grant us similar skill and discretion in right thinking "... that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding..." (Colossians 1:9).

Second, like Jesus, we should grow in stature, not just in physical height, but in spiritual maturity. Jesus began His ministry at the age of 30 (*Luke 3:23*), the customary age a priest began his duties. Like our Savior, we should reach the level when can move beyond being served to serving others. Paul explained to the Christians in Ephesus that they should "...come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a perfect man, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ; that we should no longer be children...but...grow up in all things into Him who is the head—Christ..." (Ephesians 4:13-15).

Third, like Jesus, we should grow in favor with God, increasing in our faith, seeking His will, and demonstrating the fruits of good works. Jesus received His Father's endorsement at His baptism, when "...a voice came from heaven which said, 'You are My beloved Son; in You I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22). Jesus lived a life of perfect obedience and sacrifice. Through the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit, we too can adopt a lifestyle that honors God. Hebrews 13:16 sums up such a changed life: "But do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased."

Fourth, like Jesus, we should grow in favor with men. Jesus wasn't born to live a perfect spiritual life in isolation, but to minister to mankind. Jesus taught that His purpose was not to be serve, but to serve, even to the point of death. "And I, if I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all peoples to Myself" (John 12:32). We can't be salt and light if we stay inside our salt shakers and hide under those bushel baskets. Instead, we like the early Church need to engage with others, serving as witnesses to the Gospel in both word and deed. "So continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, they ate their food with gladness and simplicity of heart, praising God and having favor with all the people" (Acts 2:46-47).

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in November:

- A motion was approved to grant a letter transferring the membership of William & Iris Rodgers, upon their request, to Tom's Creek United Methodist Church of Emmitsburg, MD.
- A motion to grant a letter transferring the membership of Laura Luhn, upon her request, to First Baptist Church of Deer Park, WA was adopted.
- A motion to approve the membership application of Chris Frazier, who was baptized on Sep. 25, passed.
- A bypass motion to pay for the meals of children 12 and under at the Dec. 4 Christmas dinner and redistribute unused funds within the Outreach Cmte. budget was approved.

Expected at the December Business Meeting:

- The Finance Cmte. will offer a motion to approve its recommended 2017 Church budget. The proposed budget amount of \$190,014 is \$7,637 less than the 2016 adjusted budget amount of \$201,350, which to date includes over \$3,699 in Cooperative Program giving beyond the minimum budgeted amount of \$10,000.
- The Internal Administration Cmte. will offer a motion to transfer unused funds within its budget to the Telecommunications BLI for regular bills and one-time church website upgrades.
- The Internal Administration Cmte. will offer a motion to authorize the creation of a Pickup Truck Fund and transfer gift funds to the 2016 and 2017 budgets for commercial vehicle insurance and maintenance and repair costs.
- The Internal Administration Cmte. will offer a motion to construct a porch over the entrance steps to the Fellowship Hall and transfer gift funds to the Physical Plant BLI to pay for the expenses of the construction.
