The Pastor's Spotlight

As Christians we should bear a striking likeness to Jesus. In the Bible we learn how Jesus taught deep truths and preached powerful messages to the people. But Jesus was best known for His lifestyle of love and mercy. If we profess to be a child of God, and if we are to partake of all of His blessings and love, then we should be like Jesus in all our ways. My prayer for all of us is that the people around us will be able to say of us, "Wow, that person has been with Jesus. He or she is different in a good way; he or she is patient, kind, and compassionate". When they are drawn to our Christlikeness, we can both share and show them the gospel by our own living testimony.

We can best imitate Jesus by showing a loving spirit and by thinking, speaking, and acting kindly. Our Lord gave us so many great examples of love and mercy to live by, but one that rings so true to me is His willingness to forgive others. He forgave not just repentant sinners but His enemies. Paul reminded us of this Christlike trait in *Colossians 3:13: "Bear* with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you". Forgiveness is key to being all that God wants us to be.

As you read *Acts 4:8-10* you will see how bold Peter and John were in their testimony and how they stood firm on living out the love and mercy of Jesus: *"Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: 'Rulers and elders of the people! If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a man who was lame and are being asked how he was healed, then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed". The end result was that God was glorified and many came to know Jesus because Peter and John followed their Savior's example in their daily lives. Exciting times are ahead of us, so let's pray and examine ourselves to ensure that we are right with God and following Jesus' example of living a lifestyle of love and mercy.*



The Pew Perspective

Last month I introduced BBC's distinctives, the spiritual qualities and ministry priorities that makes our congregation the church that it is. The first distinctive I would like to discuss in detail is unity. When a church is strong in the quality of unity, its individual members share a common identity, harmony in purpose, and consistency in action. Unity is not ignoring new and different opinions or requiring groupthink, but holding the perspective that what we have in common is more important than what we don't, and that we can disagree without being disagreeable.

So, what does unity look like at a practical level? It shows up first in small, less noticeable things and then becomes evident in larger ways. At BBC, I would say that we are doing well on modeling the following practices of unity:

First, we have open lines of communication. Jesus told His disciples He called them not servants but friends "...for all things that I heard from My Father I have made known to you" (John 15:15). We share news through conversations, prayer lists, and Facebook posts. Decisions are made democratically and announced publicly. Second, we resolve conflicts and don't let disagreements fester. Paul urged in Romans 12:18: "If it is possible, as much as depends on you, live peaceably with all men". That means we must continue to forgive others and seek forgiveness when they or we make mistakes.

Third, we rebound from setbacks. We move forward together in the Lord's strength through trials and adversity, knowing that "...in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us" (Romans 8:37).

The blessings of unity aren't just good for us, but extend to others. Fourth, we are unified in a desire to minister to others in Christ's name. From hosting VBS for the community to offering bereavement care to families in loss to being a top giver for missions offerings to the new Food Ministry, our corporate desire to minister practical help and the truth of the Gospel to others is key to our effectiveness. "We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers, remembering without ceasing your work of faith, labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ..." (I Thessalonians 1:2-3).

Fifth, we are strengthened in our ability to reach out to others by combining our complimentary mix of skills and talents in common purpose. We have members who are skillful with their hands, hearts, and voices, talented in teaching and ministry, and gifted in leadership and evangelism. We need everyone's unique abilities to accomplish all that God has set before us. "There are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are differences of ministries, but the same Lord" (I Corinthians 12:4-5).

The Corinthian Church was weakened by factionalism when Paul urged them to live in unity for the cause of Christ. "Now I plead with you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (I Corinthians 1:10). We can only represent our Savior well when we put Him first, others second, and ourselves last.
