The Pew Perspective

As you enter the BBC sanctuary through the main doors and you look down the center aisle, what will you first see? A large open Bible in the English language, sitting atop the communion table. That might seem extremely obvious and uninteresting, but the decision to have the Bible front and center, available and accessible, speaks to the fourth BBC distinctive, a high view of Scripture. We do not look to tradition or institutions like the SBC for spiritual guidance and direction or right standing with God. Instead, everything we believe and do as Christians and as a church is firmly grounded in the Bible, the vehicle by which God has communicated to us His truth for all time. I would like to emphasize three practical ways how a high view of Scripture protects and upholds a church body, and why BBC stands on that principle.

First, looking to the Bible as the sole basis of truth and right gives us an objective standard to judge subjective experiences. In other words, when someone makes a claim about what "God says", we have a way to test whether that claim is true. The Apostle Paul warned the young pastor Timothy of the need for spiritual discernment so that the church was not swept away by false teachings. "...In latter times some will depart from the faith, giving heed to deceiving spirits and doctrines of demons..." (I Timothy 4:1). For example, if someone said that "God told me thus and so in a dream" or "I feel in my heart that Jesus wants us to do that", we can compare that individual belief with the unchanging truth in God's Word and see if they are compatible. If that personal experience or position is not supported by or does not agree with the Bible, then it should be rejected and dismissed.

Second, holding the Bible in higher regard than any individual preacher, leader, or friend is necessary for the ties among a body of believers to be strong enough to withstand trials and tribulations. The Apostle Paul counseled the Corinthian church not to be swept up by personalities, which had fractured that congregation into cliques. "Now I say this, that each of you says, 'I am of Paul,' or 'I am of Apollos,' or 'I am of Cephas,' or 'I am of Christ.' Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul" (I Corinthians 1:12-13)? Individual pastors, ministry leaders, and friends will come and go, but only a common bond and belief in learning and living out biblical truths will bind and grow churchgoers into a lifelong spiritual family.

Third, following the Bible in matters of faith and practice allows us to avoid the controversies engulfing other denominations. In *Psalm 119:165*, we read of the blessing of walking in biblical truth: "Great peace have those who love Your law, and nothing causes them to stumble". It is sad to see so many churches being reported on in the media not for their efforts to spread the Gospel or for the effectiveness of their ministry outreach, but because their membership numbers are falling and different camps are threatening to split off from the main group. Once strong and vibrant churches are collapsing because they cannot agree on whether to follow the clear teachings of Scripture or to accommodate modern sensibilities. We as Southern Baptists are blessed that when our denomination came to a similar crossroad in the late 1970s and early '80s, godly leaders were elected who stood up for biblical truth.

For all these reasons, BBC holds to a high view of scripture.
