The Pastor's Spotlight

Just a few weeks ago we gathered on Good Friday to remember the terrible cost that Jesus bore on the cross to atone for our sins and reconcile us back to the Father. On Easter Sunday, the choir sang the powerful message of Jesus' love and resurrection. One of the most powerful and uplifting verses about the resurrection are Jesus' words in *John 20:17* to Mary Magdalene: "... I am ascending to My Father and your Father, and to My God and your God". Jesus, having completed the task appointed by His Father, now reigns with the Lord, seated at His right hand. Now that's something to get excited about! Indeed, Mary Magdalene "...told the disciples that she had seen the Lord, and that He had spoken these things to her" (John 20:18).

Jesus' resurrection promises us renewed life in this world and eternal security in the next, which should develop in us an attitude of gratitude, confidence, and hope. Our future with God based on Jesus' work on the cross is so permanent and secure that nothing can ever shake us loose from God's love and purpose for our lives. What joy and peace that can give us, if we will fully trust in God's goodness and the promises in His Word. Always remind yourselves how much Jesus loved us by sacrificing Himself on the cross that we might be reconciled to God. Those amazing promises should never get old or dull. Jesus, before He went to the cross, left His followers with encouragement by promising that, "...if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself..." (John 14:3). The joy of that news should inspire us each day. And it's more than just a feeling. Jesus didn't leave us alone when He returned to heaven. Instead, He sent His Holy Spirit to guide, strengthen, and encourage believers each day. When we realize that we have the Father's love, Jesus as our Savior and Lord, and the Holy Spirit as our Comforter, we already have everything we need to do whatever Almighty God purposes for our lives until Christ comes back for His Church. Are you ready? "He who testifies to these things says, "surely I am coming quickly." Amen. Even so, come, Lord Jesus" (Revelation 22:20)!

The Pew Perspective

If you've been reading the biblical accounts of Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection this Easter season, you've probably looked at verses from all four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. You may have wondered why isn't there just one start-to-finish account instead. With four separate gospels, we get four unique perspectives that tell the same overall story. Imagine that you are a police officer investigating a car accident. Would you only want to hear from the driver at fault, or other witnesses as well? In the same way, each of the four gospel writers contributed to the whole of all that we need to know about the life and ministry of Jesus. The gospels both provide similar information about the same incidents and provide extra levels of detail that other gospel writers didn't specify. The first three gospels are known as the "synoptic" gospels because they are the most similar; "synoptic" comes from the Greek term for "seeing together".

Matthew was an eyewitness to the ministry of Jesus as one of His 12 apostles. As a Jew, he was familiar with the Old Testament and Jewish religion and culture, and wrote from that perspective. Matthew's particular goal was to show to the Jewish nation that Jesus was the promised Messiah and prophesied King. Seventeen times *Matthew* used the phrase "fulfilled which was spoken" to indicate how what Jesus did was foretold in prophecy. Matthew also recorded many of Jesus' parables, sermons, and acts of healing as well as Jesus' confrontations with the Jewish religious leaders.

Mark was not an eyewitness but was instead a companion of the Apostle Peter, whose teachings Mark recorded. Mark wrote to a primarily Roman audience, explaining or omitting details about Jewish customs. *Mark* skips over Jesus' genealogy and birth, unlike *Matthew* and *Luke*. Instead, Mark wrote a fast-paced narrative, often using words like "immediately", and emphasized Jesus' humanity and suffering as a servant during His ministry. "...The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45).

Luke had also never met Jesus, but he was a close companion of the Apostle Paul and a careful historian that recorded the stories of those who did know Jesus personally "...having investigated everything carefully from the beginning, [I wrote] it out for you in consecutive order..." (Luke 1:3). As a Gentile doctor, Luke emphasized Jesus' love for the unpopular, weak, and oppressed: women, children, sinners, foreigners, and the sick. If Luke had a theme verse, it would be "...the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 19:10). Luke used Greek words and terms instead of Hebrew or Latin vocabulary.

John was an apostle and eyewitness like Matthew, and at the end of his life provided information that was not recorded in the synoptic gospels. John's particular purpose in writing his gospel was that "...you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:31). Indeed, the themes of Jesus' divinity and the need to believe in order to be saved are dominant throughout the book of John. John didn't record any of Jesus' parables but focused on His seven "I AM" statements and eight major miracles to portray Jesus as the Son of God.
