The Pew Perspective

In *Acts 15:36-41*, the disagreement between the Apostle Paul and Barnabas over whether to take John Mark on their second missionary journey has always left me wondering who was right. In the end, both Paul and Barnabas got their way: Paul took Silas while Barnabas took John Mark to another destination, but the sharp disagreement between two brothers in the Lord was regrettable.

For background, Paul, Barnabas, and John Mark all started the first missionary journey together and things were fine while they preached in Cyprus. The trouble started in *Acts 13:13: "Now when Paul and his party set sail from Paphos, they came to Perga in Pamphylia; and John, departing from them, returned to Jerusalem".* Why John Mark left isn't clear: was he scared, bored, tired, homesick? The Bible doesn't say, but for whatever reason, John Mark deserted Paul and Barnabas and went home. So when the time for the second missionary trip arose, Paul's view was firm in *Acts 15:38: "But Paul insisted that they should not take with them the one who had departed from them in Pamphylia, and had not gone with them to the work."*

Was Paul being too harsh toward John Mark or was he saving the youth from a greater fall? Consider Paul's description of how his missionary journeys went in *II Corinthians 11:24-28:* "...five times I received forty stripes minus one. Three times I was beaten with rods; once I was stoned; three times I was shipwrecked...in perils of robbers...in perils in the city... among false brethren...in weariness and toil, in sleeplessness often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness...". Would it be fair to allow someone like John Mark to be defeated and overcome by such punishing physical and spiritual demands? Would it be wise to lay the heavy burden, scrutiny, and expectations of spiritual leadership on someone so young and inexperienced?

While Paul evaluated John Mark's spiritual leadership, Barnabas was looking at John Mark from the perspective of redemption. Would it benefit the Kingdom to leave John Mark in a state of failure? What better way than going on the second missionary journey would there be for John Mark to correct his previous mistakes and improve? Isn't the church the place that hurting and imperfect people should be able to go to get help and address their problems honestly and without shame?

Perhaps the answer is that both Paul and Barnabas were right about John Mark. Like Paul, we need to maintain high standards of spiritual maturity for those in positions of leadership (*I Timothy 5:22*) so that the inexperienced and immature (*I Timothy 3:6*) are not set up for defeat and failure. And like Barnabas, we should not condemn or judge other sinners like us when they stumble and fall (*Romans 14:10*) as if we were better than them (*Romans 12:3*) but instead help to restore our brothers in Christ back to strength (*Galatians 6:1*).

The best part of the story about John Mark is at the end. Whatever happened in between led to John Mark's becoming an effective and valuable Kingdom worker and to an eventual reconciliation with Paul. In *II Timothy 4:11*, Paul made the following request: *"Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful to me for ministry."*

Report from the Monthly Business Meeting in August:

- The Church authorized Church officer and committee position vacancies for the 2020-2022 term.
- The Internal Administration Cmte.'s proposed by-law to create a Select Committee on the 150th Anniversary of Barnesville Baptist Church was adopted.
- The Worship Cmte. motion to increase the 2020 Video Upgrade budget line item by \$1,000 to purchase a new laptop for live-streaming services was approved.
- The Church approved the Worship Cmte.'s recommendation to adopt of a by-law to create the office of Audio-Visual Technician.

Expected at the September Business Meeting:

- Under the provisions of the Mar. 2020 By-Law to Define Church Operations During Emergency Conditions, on Aug. 24, 2020, the Pastor and Deacons set the date of the Sep. 2020 business meeting for Sep. 9, 2020.
- A motion to appoint as many as five messengers for the 85th Montgomery Baptist Association Annual Meeting, being held virtually on Oct. 11 from BBC, will be offered.
