The Pastor's Spotlight

I have been asked lately, how do I start to read the Bible? What should I read first? How do I go about studying God's Word? How can I understand God's Word better as I read it? I am excited that so many of you are asking these questions because it means that the Holy Spirit is moving within His church. "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:15).

There are many different ways to start studying God's Word, the main thing is to begin. You can start by finding a modern translation of the Bible, a pencil, and a highlighter. Pick one of the gospels in the New Testament (John and Luke are good choices) and get a picture of the life and ministry of Jesus. Ask the Lord to speak to you, then read the first paragraph. Look for something to underline, circle, or highlight that caught your attention. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal the living word to you as you read. Remember that all of God's Word is true and relevant. "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (II Timothy 3:16). Then read the next paragraph and do the same. Ask yourself these questions as you read: Is there a truth to learn? A promise to claim? A prayer to speak? A command to obey? A truth to apply to your life now? If a verse is confusing to you, put a question mark there so you ask about it later. If something thrills you put an exclamation mark there. If you find a verse that you want to memorize, highlight it with a different color. Take it slow, verse by verse, and even word by word. When you finish that book, go to another one and before you know it the whole Bible will be marked. If you have a study Bible with notes and references, it will help you a lot to understand the context and locate related passages. Whatever you do, don't grow discouraged, frustrated, or disappointed. The more you study God's Word, the more it will get in to you, and the more you'll want to read it. And the more you absorb God's Word, the more you will live out its truths in your life. To God be the glory, great things He has and will do when we study His living Word, the Bible.

direction, a destination, a transformation, and a purpose. God's direction for Abraham's life was simple to understand but came at great cost: leave everything behind. "Get out of your country, from your family, and from your father's house" (Genesis 12:1). That meant not just a location, but to leave the old and familiar, the safe and comfortable. What's even more interesting to consider is that Abraham left home and didn't go back. Abraham only went several hundred miles

away, not across the oceans or around the world. It was more than possible for him to go back, but he didn't because he wanted to go and be where God sent him *(Hebrews 11:15-16)*.

God gave Abraham four things when He called him: a

God's destination for Abraham was also less than precisely defined when he started out. God's initial description was just "...a land that I will show you" (Genesis 12:1). Abraham apparently knew enough to go to the land of Canaan, the land God promised was his, even though he spent the rest of his life in tents. In the following chapters of Genesis, Abraham is described as someone who kept moving from place to place, sometimes at Shechem, sometimes in Hebron, or even Egypt. Abraham freely allowed his nephew Lot to choose the land he wanted to have while Abraham was content with whatever was left over. Abraham's apparent ease with his situation can only be explained by his trust in God's promise that Abraham would inherit all of Canaan, even though he didn't possess or control any of it except for a small burial plot.

God's transformation of Abraham was amazing when you compare where he started with where he finished. Abraham went from a fatherless old man with a barren wife to the ancestor of unnumbered multitudes. God delivered on his promise that "I will make you a great nation" (Genesis 12:2). God also worked on Abraham's faith. More than once Abraham gave in to fear and doubt, hiding the fact that Sarah was his wife or trying to achieve God's promise on his own terms by fathering Ishmael. But Abraham grew in his faith to the point that he was willing to sacrifice his son of promise, Isaac, reasoning that God would raise him from the dead if need be to fulfill His promises (Hebrews 11:17-19).

God's purpose for Abraham's life was much bigger than Abraham could ever imagine or hope for himself. When God told Abraham that "in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed" (Genesis 12:3), Abraham was stuck on the fact that he was childless and that fact was unlikely to change. It's unclear just how much Abraham knew of God's ultimate plan that would unfold over the centuries and generations to come. But God repeated and reaffirmed His covenant promises with Abraham, removing all the barriers and challenges in his life so that His will came to pass. Abraham's faith that God could and would achieve the impossible in his life was what pleased God the most.

God's calling for each of us is the same as He had for Abraham: a path to follow, a goal to achieve, changes to make, and a reason for living. Just as with Abraham, God chooses us, calls us, and shapes the course of our lives to suit His will. That looks different for each of us, but it begins with a relationship with and faith in God, through His Son, Jesus Christ, the descendant of Abraham that indeed has blessed the entire world.
