

The Pew Perspective

Jesus' followers and enemies had little in common, yet both agreed that His grave was occupied on Good Friday night but was empty on Easter morning. In other words, there was no dispute that Jesus was dead and was placed in Joseph of Arimathea's tomb. There were only two explanations offered for Jesus' empty grave. The Jewish leaders said His disciples stole the body while behind a massive stone marked with a Roman seal as Roman guards slept (*Matthew 27:66, 28:13-15*). Negligence on guard duty was punishable by death, so the Jewish leaders had to pay the Roman soldiers heavy bribes to gain their agreement for that explanation of Jesus' empty tomb. Jesus' followers said that He had risen bodily from the dead. Resurrection is not only the best explanation for the empty tomb, but it provides the most plausible reason for other facts about what happened after Jesus' death.

First, the resurrection best explains the multiple, independent reports of witnesses who saw Jesus alive and well after His crucifixion and burial. The initial reports of Jesus' resurrection came from his women followers: "...He appeared first to Mary Magdalene..." (Luke 24:1-11, Mark 16:9-11). Women were considered unreliable witnesses under Jewish law, so the only reason the Gospels would have cited the women's eyewitness testimonies of the risen Christ was because they were true. In I Corinthians 15:5-8, the Apostle Paul highlighted others who saw the risen Christ: Peter, the apostles, 500 at once, James, and Paul himself. The scramble on the opposite column lists 17 times Jesus was seen by various evewitnesses under multiple circumstances, times, and places. While many were already followers of Jesus when they saw Him resurrected, two stand out as initially hostile to Jesus: James and Paul. James was Jesus' half-brother who must have resented his "special" older sibling; John 7:5 notes: "For even His brothers did not believe in Him". Yet James became the leader of the Jerusalem church and author of a New Testament epistle. Acts 9 describes how Saul the Pharisee and enemy of the Church was converted on the Damascus Road. Both James and Saul/Paul were confronted with the risen Christ and their doubt and opposition were replaced with faith and obedience unto death.

Second, the resurrection best explains the radical change in the apostles' attitudes and the founding of the Church. The apostles were afraid and in hiding shortly after Jesus' arrest: "Then all the disciples forsook Him and fled" (Matthew 26:56). Even on Easter Sunday, the apostles rejected the resurrection reports they received from Mary Madaglene and the Emmaus disciples (Mark 16:11,13). It wasn't until Jesus appeared to the apostles directly that they believed: "...He rebuked their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they did not believe those who had seen Him after He had risen" (Mark 16:14). The apostles' bold, public witness and ministry in Jesus' name in Acts 3-4, even in defiance of the same Jewish leaders who had crucified Jesus, was starkly different from the frightened and defeated behavior of followers whose Teacher had been killed a few months before. Only a rocksolid conviction that Jesus had risen from the dead would have set the apostles on a life-long effort to preach and teach

the Gospel of Jesus even at the cost of their lives. And third, the resurrection best explains why worship shifted from the Jewish Sabbath on Saturday to the Lord's Day on Sunday. The seventh-day Sabbath was set in the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:8-11), so only something as significant as the resurrection of the Messiah could have explained how devout Jews like Jesus' followers set aside all the rules about the Sabbath. Christian worship is on Sundays to recall Jesus' resurrection: "...He rose early on the first day of the week..." (Mark 16:9; John 20:1,19). Sunday worship was an early practice of the first-century church in Jerusalem: "Now on the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread..." (Acts 20:7) and assumed as normal in Gentile services by the Apostle Paul: "On the first day of the week let each one of you lay something aside..." (I Corinthians 16:2). As we today worship weekly on Sundays, we recall and celebrate Jesus' resurrection as a historical fact.
