The Pew Perspective

We are currently studying the book of *Jonah* during Wednesday night Bible study. The prophet Jonah, as you may recall, was called by God to preach repentance to the city of Nineveh, a wicked and violent enemy of Israel. Jonah refused and tried to run away from God's will when he was caught in a storm at sea, thrown overboard, and swallowed by a large fish. "Now the Lord had prepared a great fish to swallow Jonah" (Jonah 1:17). In the course of reading the study notes in my Bible, I learned something new about the story of Jonah that made me laugh. The origin of the word "Nineveh" means "fish", and the people of Nineveh worshiped fish-related gods and goddesses. Just as we today would easily associate "The Big Apple" with New York City, the people of Jonah's day would have understood the linkage between Nineveh and fish. So God, in dealing with his prophet's refusal to minister to Nineveh, sent a large fish to carry Jonah back to "Fish Town". Not only that, Jonah probably smelled like fish after spending three days and nights in the fish's belly. "So the Lord spoke to the fish, and it vomited Jonah onto dry land" (Jonah 2:10). Ultimately, God used his fishy-smelling prophet to call the fishworshiping people of "Fish Town" to repentance.

When the Lord deals with false gods in the Bible, He makes it very clear to all involved that He is the one and only true God in the universe, and that the idols worshiped by sinful men, be it in Nineveh, Canaan, or Egypt have no life or power at all. The one true God, the Creator of heaven and earth, does not share the stage with any competitors. *"I am the Lord, that is My name; and My glory I will not give to another, nor My praise to carved images" (Isaiah 42:8).*

We see the idea that God has no competition again in *I Kings 18*, when Elijah confronted the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel. Again, context is important: Baal was a storm god responsible for bringing rain and lightning. As Israel was in the midst of a drought, the showdown between the God of Elijah and the false beliefs of King Ahab and Queen Jezebel would be a definitive test as to which deity was real. After the 500 prophets of Baal failed all day to summon their god, Elijah's immediate and powerful answer from the Lord in the form of fire from heaven in *I Kings 18:38* was all the people of Israel needed to reject the false worship of Baal and acknowledge the God of Israel as the one true God. That the long drought Israel suffered ended immediately after the Mount Carmel showdown was further proof that the Lord God was responsible for everything.

God's demonstration of complete divine authority over all creation was no more obvious than in the Book of *Exodus*, when He sent 10 plagues against Egypt until Pharaoh allowed the children of Israel to go free. God systematically assaulted the Egyptian pantheon responsible for upholding the Egyptian belief system and way of life. For example, with the second plague of frogs in *Exodus 8*, the Egyptians considered the frog a sacred animal and symbol of fertility and abundance that could not be killed. God turned what the Egyptians considered a sign of abundance into a major problem. The Egyptians' chief diety was Ra, the sun god.


