The Pew Perspective

Jesus' parables are among His most memorable and well-known teachings: even non-religious people today will refer to a passerby who rescues a victim as a "good Samaritan" (*Luke 10:30-37*) or will call someone who is on the wrong path in life a "prodigal son" (*Luke 15:11-32*). Parables are a special kind of story: they use earthly things to convey spiritual truths. The word "parable" comes from two Greek words that together mean "to throw alongside", that is, to compare two things to one another by using word pictures. Jesus' parables have four qualities that make them effective teaching tools: they are real, simple, interesting, and relevant. With all four factors, Jesus' parables are more useful than just mere entertainment and more applicable than just impractical philosophy.

Jesus' parables were reality-based. Many of Jesus' parables began with "the kingdom of heaven is like". Imagine the challenge before Jesus: to explain the eternal, invisible, spiritual nature of God and His will and purpose to common, ignorant people whose minds were clouded from truth by sin. Where to begin? Instead of overwhelming them with deep theology or made-up fantasy, Jesus used familiar characters and common objects that people would have already known from their everyday lives: sheep and seeds, farmers and servants. From these basic elements Jesus brought forth stories that gave a glimpse into heavenly things.

Jesus' parables were simple. Most of Jesus' parables were short, the longest no more than a few paragraphs and some no more than a few sentences. The characters were clearly defined and didn't have complicated backstories or histories to muddle through. The actions were straightforward: planting fields with seeds (Matthew 13:3-23), searching for lost coins (Luke 15:8-10), and tending oil lamps (Matthew 25:1-13). These qualities are what help us remember and digest these

Jesus' parables were interesting. His stories grab your attention right away. The prodigal son who leaves home with his father's fortune, a man robbed on the highway and left for dead...what happens next? Even the short ones spark interest, like selling all your possessions to buy one great pearl...why? Jesus' parables were relevant. The combination of real,

simple, and interesting make Jesus' parables relevant. Even if you don't follow the lifestyle of first-century Jews, most modern-day people have still had the experiences of planting a seed or losing a valuable item and have known the frustration of not having a plant grow or not being able to find something dear to them. Being able to accept and internalize the surface story of one of Jesus' parables helps to digest the spiritual truth Jesus intended to convey.

The principles Jesus used to teach the multitudes about the kingdom of God can benefit us today as we engage those unfamiliar with spiritual matters with the message of the Gospel. It is not surprising that one of the most popular elements of our worship service is the children's story: a condensed message or object lesson about an important truth that is easy to understand, remember, and share.

Business Meeting Briefs


Business Report from January:

In-person worship resumes Feb. 20. We are looking forward to resuming in-person services on Sunday, Feb. 20! The Sunday schedule will be the same as when we last met in early January, with Sunday School at 9:30 am and worship at 10:45 am. We will continue following the indoor face mask requirement when we resume services until that rule is lifted by Montgomery County.

As we approach the second anniversary of facing this pandemic, we are thankful to God for His provision and watch care over us and appreciate your support and love as we try to navigate unforeseen challenges and changes. When we last communicated, we anticipated resuming in-person services by the end of January. While the omicron surge is rapidly decreasing from its peak, the rate of COVID-19 cases in Montgomery County is still in the "high" range.

The Pastor and Deacons agreed that waiting several more weeks should get us back into at least the "substantial" range, and is in line with what several other Montgomery Baptist Association sister churches are planning. It is our desire to have in-person worship as much as possible. Given the significant number of BBC worshipers, their family members, and local community members having caught COVID in the past several weeks, we feel it was important to have taken steps to protect one another's health.

February schedule. At-church activities begin on Saturday, Feb. 19, with the monthly Baptist Men's breakfast meeting at 7:30 am. The Deacons will hold their rescheduled annual prayer session at 9:00 am that Saturday, when they will pray over each person, family, and ministry of Barnesville Baptist Church to ask for God's provision, direction, and blessing for the coming year.
