The Pew Perspective

Who or what do you lean on in life? As we navigate the trials and challenges of this world, there are people and things that we count for strength and confidence. Many rely on possessions and wealth, family and friends, or power and reputation to protect them. Many times, those factors can help people gain success and defend against hardships, but they can also quickly melt away, leaving us exposed and weak. When we rely on earthly guarantees, they become crutches, temporary sources of relief that are no substitute for the one and only true source of strength and guidance, Almighty God. As we see in the life of David, he quickly lost everything he had. The future king was able to endure because he never lost focus on God.

In I Samuel 17, David was doing very well in life, a young shepherd boy who had defeated Goliath the enemy giant with nothing but five smooth stones, a sling, and God on his side. David, known as a man after God's own heart (I Samuel 13:14), had already been anointed by Samuel the prophet as the next king of Israel (I Samuel 16). David had previously been selected by King Saul to be his personal musician (I Samuel 17:23) and armorbearer (I Samuel 17:21), giving David direct access to the royal court, an excellent position to gain experience and knowledge about how to rule. After his victory over Goliath, David was honored by Saul as a military leader and gained favor with the people (I Samuel 18:5). David was also due rewards from Saul for killing Goliath: "...the king will enrich with great riches, will give him his daughter, and give his father's house exemption from taxes in Israel" (I Samuel 17:25). Yet God had a different path for David, one that took him away from what seemed to be an obvious and logical plan for training a future king. David was at the cusp of well-earned and deserved power, fame and position. He had done nothing wrong in the sight of God and he had done nothing to hurt Saul. Indeed, David was solving Saul's problems for him right and left. Nevertheless, David went from the most promising member of the future leaders of Israel club to an outcast. In fact, David's troubles started with his greatest triumph. As Israel celebrated David's victory over Goliath, the women of the land began to sing: "Saul has killed his thousands, and David his ten thousands" (I Samuel 18:7)! King Saul was filled with jealousy, anger, and suspicion, afraid that David would move against him and take away his throne. Saul's bad reaction toward David was worsened by the knowledge that God had rejected him as king (I Samuel 15:26) and because he was tormented by an evil spirit (I Samuel 16:14). Before long, Saul tried to kill David and then pursued him relentlessly throughout Israel, seeking to take his life. Everything that David had achieved was taken away overnight.

First, David lost his position in the king's court. As a military hero, David had achieved success, rank, riches, and lived among royalty. Yet Saul in a fit of rage tried to spear David to the wall, and he had to flee for his life (*I Samuel 19:8–10*). Second, David was cut off from the love and loyalty of his wife Michal. David was made Saul's son-in-law as part of his reward for killing Goliath. Yet Saul pursued David to his own house, so much that Michal had to deceive her father to prevent him from killing David in bed (*I Samuel 19:11–17*). David had to flee and escape overnight and was unable to return to his wife as Saul pursued him. Third, David was deprived of the support and guidance of his mentor Samuel, who had anointed him king. Saul again followed David to Ramah, where Samuel lived, so he had to go

on the run again (*I Samuel 19:18–22; 20:1*). Fourth, David was deprived of the loyalty and encouragement of his best friend Jonathan, the son of Saul. Even Jonathan's pleadings for David would not sway Saul from trying to destroy David, so he had to leave Israel and live as a fugitive (*I Samuel 20:1–4, 30–33, 41–42*). And fifth, David had to give up his pride and dignity. Not only was he hounded out of his native country, David ended up in the land of his enemy, before Achish the king of Gath. As recorded in *I Samuel 21:10–14*, David went to Goliath's town, where the people had not forgotten what David had done to their hometown hero. David had to act like a crazy man to keep them at bay; he "…pretended madness in their hands, scratched on the doors of the gate, and let his saliva fall down on his beard…" (*I Samuel 21:13*).

Even though David's world fell apart, God had not abandoned him, and David did not lose his focus on the Lord. Although it took many years, David became king as God had promised. As it says in *Proverbs 3:5–6*, we are to trust in God and not our own wisdom. When we rely on Him and not our own crutches, He directs our path in life for our good and His glory.

SBC news. The 2022 Southern Baptist Convention Annual Meeting was held in Anaheim, CA on Jun. 14-15 with more than 12,000 in attendance; the theme was "Jesus at The Center of it All". Pastor Bart Barber of Farmersville, TX was elected as the new SBC president after a run-off election. Among the most significant actions taken by the messengers were the creation of the Abuse Reform Implementation Task Force to implement sexual abuse reforms and an online database of convicted or confessed sexual abusers in SBC churches. Fifty-two International Missions Board missionaries were commissioned for overseas service during the meeting. The 2023 annual meeting will be held Jun. 13-14 in New Orleans, LA.
