The Pew Perspective

Imagine, if you will, that you are Barabbas, on the morning before Passover, in the dungeon of the Antonia Fortress in Jerusalem. You are awaiting execution by the Romans. Your cell is dark and crowded with fellow prisoners, who, like you, have committed violent crimes and rebellion against the occupying Roman authorities. Matthew called Barabbas a "notorious prisoner" (27:16), Mark said Barabbas was a rebel and a murderer (15:7), and John described him as a "robber" (18:40). Luke explained that Barabbas was in prison "...for a certain rebellion made in the city, and for murder" (23:19). Very little light, much less news about your fate, reaches you in the depths of the Roman citadel. Little do you know that on this Passover eve, the Roman governor, Pontius Pilate, is examining a Galilean preacher who has been accused by the Jewish priests and scribes for stirring up trouble in Israel. Neither can you see that a large and unruly crowd is gathered before Pilate and the preacher from Nazareth named Jesus. But you can hear the noise of the crowd and can tell that there is anger and passion in the cry of voices that reaches your prison cell. Not every word is clear and distinct, but you can pick out the loudest chants. Suddenly, you hear your own name: "Barabbas" (Matthew 27:21)!

Something else is said, but it's impossible to make out. The next refrain you hear is: "Let Him be crucified" (Matthew 27:22)! Panic and fear grip you. You know that your end would soon come, but not today, never on Passover. Again, there is a lull in the noise of crowd, but again they chant, "Let Him be crucified" (Matthew 27:23)!

The Roman guards come and drag you out of your cell, into the bright and blinding light of the day. You prepare for the end, but instead of whips and nails, you hear the most unlikely words: you have been freed!

We do not know what happened to Barabbas afterward: did he cross paths with Jesus as He was taken away to be scourged? Did Barabbas learn that the crowd was calling for him to be freed and for Jesus to be crucified? Did he even have a drop of sympathy or remorse that Jesus took his place on the Roman cross intended for him that day? Did Barabbas change his ways or did he continue a life of violence and murder?

We know that Jesus came as the substitute sacrifice for mankind, to take on the sin of the world through His suffering, crucifixion, and death. Throughout the New Testament we hear of Jesus' sacrifice for us: in Mark 10:45, the Son of Man came "...to give His life a ransom for many"; in II Corinthians 5:21, Jesus is called "...Him who knew no sin to be sin for us..."; in Ephesians 5:2, we learn that Christ gave "...Himself for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God..."; Paul reminds us in I Timothy 1:15 that "...Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners"; and John tells us in Revelation 13:8 that Jesus is "...the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world". But even more amazing is that Jesus died just for us. Each one of us. Barabbas was the first individual for whom Jesus took undeserved punishment. It easily could have been Barabbas between the two thieves on the cross. But instead, Jesus took his place. As you reflect on the cost of Jesus' death this Easter, remember that He came to take away your punishment, your sin. As you remember Jesus, ask Him to remember you so that you can be with Him, in Paradise (Luke 23:42-43).
