The BBC Pastor Search Committee (PSC) is pleased to announce that our application for the position of pastor is now published; we are accepting responses from candidates through June 15. The position notice has been posted on our Facebook page and shared with the Montgomery Baptist Association, the BCM/D, and the SBC, who have included our position notice in their newsletters and/or job search pages. We have also sent the position notice to the SBC's Southern and Southeastern seminaries and Liberty University.

While we are receiving applications, the PSC is developing an application evaluation form as a tool to grade each candidate's entry consistently as we review the applications. The PSC will also be preparing additional questions to ask as we further narrow down the list of candidates to those we will interview in person.

We would ask each member of the BBC family to pray over our pastor search process. Please lift up the following:

1. That God is leading the right man to BBC to be our next pastor;

2. That God would direct our future pastor to fill out the application;

3. That God has been preparing the right man all along to be an effective preacher, teacher, and shepherd for the BBC congregation and community;

4. That God would lead the Pastor Search Committee through the interview process to recognize His choice for pastor;5. That the membership of BBC would support and affirm the choice of pastor that God will set before us; and

6. That God would receive all the glory and honor as our next pastor leads us to serve Him and share His gospel.

What happened to the Apostle Paul after his conversion? The account of what happened to the former Saul of Tarsus on the road to Damascus and how he encountered the resurrected Christ is found in Acts 9, but there is a break in the timeline between verses 22 and 23. Paul fills in the gap about his earliest years as a Christian in his epistle to the Galatians, where he explained his three-year stay in the wilderness of Arabia. "I did not immediately confer with flesh and blood. nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me; but I went to Arabia, and returned again to Damascus" (Galatians 1:16-17). Paul was instructed in the gospel message during his time in the Arabian desert. Galatians 1:12 reads, "For I neither received [the gospel] from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through the revelation of Jesus Christ". In the absence of any human teacher, Paul's time of preparation was either based on direct revelation by Christ, or by careful study of the (Old Testament) scriptures, or perhaps a combination of both. It is interesting that Paul spent three years in preparation for ministry, just as Jesus taught the apostles for three years. In any case, when Paul completed his time alone, he went to Jerusalem to see the other evewitnesses of Jesus' resurrection.

In Galatians 1:18, Paul explained how he visited Jerusalem to conduct an investigation of the gospel with Peter, the chief apostle, and with James, the head pastor of the Jerusalem church: "Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to see Peter, and remained with him fifteen days. But I saw none of the other apostles except James, the Lord's brother". Paul wanted to verify that everything he had experienced and been taught about Jesus was the same as that believed by His main followers. After that meeting of three evewitnesses to the resurrection, it is likely that I Corinthians 15:3-7 was the result. The parallels between the wording of the I Corinthians passage and Paul's visit with Peter and James recorded in Galatians are compelling. It is significant that Paul explained to the Corinthians that those verses weren't from him, but something he was taught and was in turning passing down to them: "For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received..." (I Corinthians 15:3). Paul's visit to Jerusalem was an obvious opportunity for Peter and James to share with Paul one of the earliest Christian teachings about the resurrection of Christ. The *I Corinthians* passage also ties the key facts of the gospel message--Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection--to the (Old Testament) Scriptures, which was a point of emphasis for Peter in his early Acts sermons. Finally, of the 514 eyewitnesses to Christ's resurrection identifed in that passage, only three are named: Peter ("Cephas"), James, and Paul ("me"), the same men who were part of the Galatians 1 meeting.

Paul's careful investigation of the facts of the resurrection was not just the thorough research of a highly-trained religious scholar. As Paul wrote just a few verses after, "And if Christ is not risen, then our preaching is empty and your faith is also empty" (I Corinthians 15:14). Paul wanted to know that what he experienced on the Damascus road so many years before matched up with scripture and was agreed with by other eyewitnesses. As we know, Paul spent the rest of his life



preaching the gospel, so it makes sense that he wanted to verify as much as possible everything he believed and taught others. Paul repeated his investigation of the gospel 14 years later in a return trip to Jerusalem (Galatians 2:1), meeting again with Peter and James, as well as with John (2:9), whom Paul described as "pillars" of the church (Galatians 2:9). Indeed, Peter and John were among the top three of Jesus' 12 disciples (Matthew 17:1, Mark 5:37) and James the brother of Jesus was also a senior leader in the Jerusalem church (Acts 12:17). By the time of Paul's second visit to the apostles, strong debates about whether Gentile Christians needed to follow Jewish law were brewing. Paul, having been away from the apostles for a long time, again wanted to ensure that His gospel message about only needing to believe in Christ and not relying on circumcision as a requirement for salvation (Acts 15). Having explained his preaching to the apostles (Galatians 2:2), they ...added nothing to me" (Galatians 2:6), that is, the apostles had no corrections or additions for Paul and his preaching of the gospel. Indeed, in Acts 15:25-26, the apostles sent out a letter to all the churches describing Paul as a valued gospel preacher: "...our beloved Barnabas and Paul, men who have risked their lives for the name of our Lord Jesus Christ". Paul's instruction in the gospel that he first received in Arabia was still correct and true to the teaching of Christ's apostles.

For us as followers of Christ 20 centuries afterwards, the testimonies of those who knew Christ best are important evidences for our faith. Paul and James, Jesus' brother, started out as strong opponents of Jesus, rejecting His claims to be the Son of God. Yet both of them turned into devoted supporters of Christ and leaders of the early Christian church. What turned both of them around is the undeniable proof they encountered of the resurrected Christ. We too come to faith in Christ in much the same way. We can read and research as much as we can about Jesus, but our faith in Him ultimately comes down to our personal experience with God reaching out and down to us to touch our hearts. Just like Paul, James, and the other early Christians, we believe in the resurrected Christ because we have experienced Him as well.

Offerings will be taken until the end of April. Your prayerful generosity will be much appreciated and used to share the gospel across the United States and Canada.


