"When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called My son" (Hosea 11:1).

Compared to the sweet and pure Christmas story in Luke, the account in Matthew 2 is full of action and danger, with a murderous King Herod seeking the young Jesus' life. *"Flee to Egypt" (v. 13)* was the angel's warning to Joseph, precipitating a nighttime escape. Matthew linked Jesus' sojourn to Egypt and eventual return to an Old Testament prophecy. "Out of Equpt I called Mu Son", connecting Matthew 2:15 and Hosea 11:1. A closer inspection of *Hosea 11:1* shows that the context is about the nation of Israel, not the Messiah: "When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called My son". The rest of Hosea 11 details Israel's history from the Exodus to the Exile, even commenting on Israel's sacrifices to Baal (v. 2). So what is Matthew doing taking an Old Testament verse about Israel and force-fitting it to talk about Jesus in the New? It turns out that Hosea 11 was not the only Old Testament scripture Matthew had in mind to describe Jesus.

Isaiah 49 speaks of a Servant called by the Lord from the womb of His mother (v. 1). That Servant will be named Israel (v. 3), who will "bring Jacob back to [the Lord], so that Israel is gathered to Him" (v. 5). In other words, Isaiah is saying that there are two Israels, the first a human Servant who will bring the second Israel, the nation, back to the Lord. The Servant is most certainly human, for His formation in the womb of His mother is mentioned twice (vv. 1, 5). Not only charged with redeeming His chosen people, the Lord has a greater task for His Servant Israel. He shall be a "…light to the Gentiles, that You should be My salvation to the ends of the earth" (v. 6).

God's description of Israel as His son goes back even further. In *Exodus 4:22-23*, Moses told Pharaoh that the Lord considered Israel to be His firstborn son. To King David, the Lord described a father-son relationship with his descendants in *II Samuel 7:12-16: "I will be his Father, and he shall be My son*".

Matthew's choice of Old Testament references to foreshadow Jesus' stay in Egypt is now clearer. The servantnation and father-son links used by the Old Testament would have been familiar to Matthew's Jewish audience, and they would have seen the events in Jesus' life as reflecting and paralleling those of the Jewish nation. And just as both Israel and Jesus returned from Egypt, they were both called to Egypt in similar ways. In both cases, a man named Joseph, who received dreams from heaven, brought Israel to Egypt to escape death and destruction. Whether to flee a yearslong famine or a vengeful king, the Old Testament-New Testament pattern of events would strengthen Matthew's case in showing who Jesus really was. Jesus was born to complete a mission behind enemy lines, so to speak. His life was one of suffering, discomfort, and danger. As Matthew 20:28 says, "...the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." The sacrifice and service we associate with Jesus' death at Easter truly started at the beginning of His earthly life, so Matthew's reminder of all that Christmas was helps us to better understand all that Jesus went through for us.
