I want to express my gratitude to all of you for the gracious welcome you showed to Ted and Teddy Pearce. From the feedback I received, most everyone enjoyed the virtual tour to Israel. Only being here for such a short time, I felt like I was going out on a limb inviting someone from outside to come in and make a presentation.

With your blessing, I would like to occasionally invite to BBC other groups and individuals in Christian ministry. God has many folks doing His work in some unique ways. I like when they get to tell their stories and show how God is using them. We can sometimes get in a rut always doing the same thing. I think it's nice to change things up from time to time.

One initiative I would like to start is what I am calling for now a "Fifth Sunday Celebration". My plan is that we do something a little different in our worship services anytime a month contains a fifth Sunday. Those Sundays for 2025 are March, June, August, and November.

This may mean doing things we have never done before. It may mean getting out of our comfort zone. The Apostle Paul wrote: "And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9). I appreciate everything that I see so many of you doing. It takes all of us working together to get the results that are pleasing to God.

The Pew Perspective

In late January, I concluded my stint as the Wednesday night Bible study teacher. The topic of my final class was *Romans 12-15*. You may ask why I didn't start with the first 11 chapters of Paul's longest epistle--I have taught on the beginning of *Romans* several times already but have never had enough time to go through the entire book! Thus, I chose to focus on the chapters I had not been able to teach on previously. That choice made the first verse of the study *Romans 12:1: "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service".* The phrase "reasonable service" became the most significant theme of our Bible study, in that Paul uses that those words to describe what our appropriate reaction should be to Christ's work of salvation in our lives.

The book of *Romans* can be divided into two major parts, with chapters 1-11 describing Jesus' work as savior in responding to sin, with chapter 12 to the end describing how we should react to Jesus, and how that will show up in our lives. A large part of Paul's expectation is that the way we feel about Jesus and how important He is to us will be evident in the way we live our lives and relate to others. Paul started out easy, telling us that reasonable service involves loving and prioritizing people who are more like us, fellow believers and neighbors with whom we likely share common beliefs and values. Paul then gives us the hard news, that our reasonable service to Christ also requires us to show respect to and value those we may not like and may not like us, be they unbelievers, adversaries, or governmental authorities (who in Paul's day would have been the Romans who persecuted Christians).

When we stop and think about everything Jesus has done for us, what He can "reasonably" ask of us in return becomes clear. Imagine that you owed a million-dollar debt and a friend paid off the entire balance for you. How grateful would you be to have that debt erased? How would you show your deepest thankfulness to such a friend? But even then, your bank account would have gone from negative one million to zero. A zero balance is amazingly greater than a negative balance, but it leaves you with exactly nothing for the future. In human terms, would you then ask your incredibly generous friend who just paid off your enormous debt to also start paying for your future expenses? I'd be much too embarrassed to ask for anything more from someone who just canceled my negative balance. And yet Jesus is so much more generous with us than our most compassionate human friend would ever be. Jesus not only solved all of our past problems with His forgiveness of sins, He also credited us with His love, forgiveness, and an eternal destiny with Him. Jesus transforms us from debtors to heirs when we accept His free gift of salvation that was so costly and painful for Him to provide to us. How do you show your genuine gratitude and lifelong appreciation to someone who has transformed your past, present, and future? What does "reasonable service" look like in your life when you compare it to the enormous blessings Jesus has given you?

The scriptures are amazing in that no matter how many times you read them or how well you think you know them, something new appears each time you study God's word. This time, I gained a deeper understanding of what I owe God.
