The Pastor's Spotlight

"He is not here, for he has risen, as He said" (Matthew 28:6). I cannot think of more joyous words that have ever been spoken! An angel announced to Mary Magdalene and others that the words spoken by Jesus were true. The empty tomb was proof that Jesus is who He said He is: the Messiah, the Lamb of God, the Savior of the World.

Almost 2,000 years have passed since the women were just hoping there would be a way that they could get into the tomb to prepare Jesus' body for a proper burial. Nearly two millennia have passed since John and Peter found only a piece of cloth where a couple days earlier Jesus had laid. We continue to celebrate that heartbreaking, yet wonderful occasion. I suspect, and hope, that we will do so until He returns a second time, just as He promised. Every year at Easter time, we read the words and hear the story from the Bible of how Jesus was put on trial, beaten, hung on the cross, was laid in the tomb, arose from the grave, and ascended to heaven. Even though the story is retold time and again, we never get tired of hearing it. Just like our favorite song, we want to hear it again.

I hope that you will be able to join us either in person or online throughout April as we focus much of our attention on the resurrection. Our Good Friday service on the 18th will include dramatic readings of the seven times Jesus spoke from the cross. In between each passage, the choir will lead us in singing a verse of "The Old Rugged Cross" and "At the Cross". I will need volunteers to read each of the passages. If you are comfortable reading scripture in public, please let me know that you would like to participate.

Following the Easter sunrise service on the 20th, Isabel and I are inviting everyone to the parsonage for a light breakfast and fellowship. Please plan to come hang out with us and rest a bit before Sunday School.

I look forward to all that the Lord has planned for us all this month. I encourage you to come and be a part of all that we will be doing. Jesus rose once but we get to remember and celebrate Him every day! I pray you have a blessed Easter season.

The Pew Perspective

As Jesus prepared to enter Jerusalem for His triumphal entry, the Passover crowd was excited and enthusiastic to see Him. It was widely reported in Jerusalem that Jesus had just raised Lazarus from the dead (John 11). With Bethany, Lazarus' hometown, just a short distance from Jerusalem, many people were able to visit and see both Jesus and Lazarus for themselves, which added to the heightened interest of the people. "Now a great many of the Jews knew that He was there; and they came, not for Jesus' sake only, but that they might also see Lazarus, whom He had raised from the dead" (John 12:9). Jesus, who was well known across Israel for His teaching. healings, and miraculous signs, had with Lazarus' return from the dead captured the imagination of the people. Therefore, when Jesus was spotted approaching Jerusalem, the crowds who were expecting Him began to shout: "Hosanna! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' 'Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest" (Mark 11:9-10)! The words of the crowd were carefully selected direct quotes from the Old Testament. While "hosanna" is untranslated in Mark 11:9, it comes directly from Psalm 118:25, which says, "Save now, I pray, O Lord". The request for immediate saving is addressed to the Lord, to God in *Psalm 118*, so the crowd was calling Jesus Lord in *Mark 11*. The next phrase from *Mark 11:9* is taken directly from *Psalm 118:26*: "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord"! Throughout the Old Testament, to call upon or mention the name of the Lord is equal to calling upon the Lord Himself, so the second phrase of the Palm Sunday worshipers was again equating Jesus with God. Mark 11:10's "Blessed is the kingdom of our father David" brought up a new level of meaning. Both Matthew and John recorded additional versions of the phrase, such as "Hosanna to the Son of David"! (Matthew 21:9) and "Hosanna! 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' The King of Israel" (John 12:13)! The term "son of David" is first found in II Samuel 7:12-14, when the Lord promised King David an eternal throne and a kingdom forever. His royal descendant would be a son to God. "When your days are fulfilled and you rest with your fathers, I will set up your seed after you, who will come from your body, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build a house for My name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever. I will be his Father, and he shall be My son" (II Samuel 7:12-14). "Son of David", most commonly used of King Solomon in the Old Testament, was used as a messianic title in Jesus' day. Altogether, the crowd was strongly linking Jesus with divine and royal titles, claiming that He was both God and King of Israel.

Jesus made a statement of His own with His selection of transportation. Jesus' request for a donkey-colt pair to ride into Jerusalem was directly linked to *Zechariah 9:9: Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your King is coming to you; He is just and having salvation, lowly and riding on a donkey, a colt, the foal of a donkey".* Jesus, the Son of Man, the Suffering Servant who came not to be served, but to serve, chose a humble beast of

coming to Jerusalem. The horse was the mount of a king, like the pharaohs of Egypt. As far back as Genesis 50:9, horses were associated with chariots and war, not service and humility. Donkeys, going back as far as Genesis 42:26, were considered beasts of burden, not the steeds of royalty. Jesus was truly King, but His purpose for coming to Jerusalem was to serve as a sacrifice for sin and save His people. Indeed, the voices of joy and worship of the Palm Sunday crowd turned into Good Friday's shouts of violence and reproach against Jesus in just a few days' time. The Jews were expecting a Messiah to restore their nation and cast down the Romans. When Jesus instead rebuked the Jews, their religious leaders, and their worship practices, He was suddenly rejected and hated for failing to live up to their expectations. Yet Jesus will one day receive a better recognition than the temporary and fickle reception He received in Jerusalem. According to Revelation 7:9, there will be another crowd assembled to honor and worship Him forever: "...a great multitude which no one could number, of all nations, tribes, peoples, and tongues, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed with white robes, with palm branches in their hands...".
